# **MSU OFFICE OF VP FOR RESEARCH AND EXTENSION**

The creation of the Office for VP for Research and Extension was a bold move for this administration. With the effort to have unity in Research and Extension agenda of the system, the creation of this office was a great step. Taking the BOR Approved Resolution No. 458, 2022, the said creation is explained below:

### **Rationale**

Throughout its rich history, the Mindanao State University (MSU) System has continually found new ways to meet its mission to lead in social transformation through peace education and integration of Muslims and other cultural minority groups into the mainstream society and to ensure excellence in instruction, research development, innovation, extension, and environmental education and discovery. This commitment places a premium on focused research, active community engagement throughout the MINSUPALA region, and outstanding educational programs across all disciplines. In addition to these shared values, each MSU system campus has its own history, a distinct mission, and a set of strengths that impact the nature and scope of its activities. Hence, the unique qualities of each MSU campus must be nurtured and sustained, not only with an eye to how they complement one another but also with due consideration for what sets them unique.

Relationships among the MSU campuses are collegial and collaborative in nature, but in order to accelerate the research activities and mobility of researchers and scientists of the entire university system, the creation of MSU System Vice President for Research and Extension is proposed. It is envisaged that through this office, it will further strengthen the relationships among MSU campuses as they share best practices and approaches to research, development, and innovation matters.

The general objectives of the OVPRE are to discuss each of the MSU campus' long-term research, development, and innovation plans; to strengthen MSU system collaboration, planning, and information sharing; and to advise the MSU President on ways to promote and ensure the continued quality and effectiveness of MSU system research, development, and innovation initiatives.

### **Duties and Functions**

The OVPRE is responsible for reviewing and forming the research, development, and innovation policy of the entire MSU system to be submitted to the Board of Regents for approval. The OVPRE shall head the System Research and Extension Planning Council (REPC). A majority vote of the REPC will decide on policy recommendations. The REPC will follow open meeting rules when it assumes governance or policymaking responsibilities. The OVPRE shall have the following specific duties and functions:

- 1. To advise and assist the MSU President in formulating the research, development, and innovation plan of the University;
- 2. To develop and evolve financial projections based on the long-term research, development, and innovation plan of the University;
- 3. To review the MSU system's long-term research, development, and innovation plans annually and propose the necessary changes;
- 4. To provide strategic planning to maximize the research, development, and innovation productivity of the researchers and scientists of the University and to support highly innovative, transformative research; and 5. To advise and allocate regarding the allocation of flexible resources of the University

# Basari@One: An Insider's View from the SAs

As you pass through the glass doors leading to the rooms that make up the Office of the President, the small lobby you step into will face a small glass enclosure, populated with the expected office desks and chairs. This is where we, OP special assistants, consultants, a handpicked group, along with some executive assistants, do our work, helping facilitate the day-to-day business of MSU-Marawi and on many occasions, that of the System.

While we don't exactly see the President everyday, we do deal with university matters involving either his signature or his very own presence, so it can be said that we get to have more interactions with him than the average MSU constituent. It's pretty common for us to get asked: "What's President Basari "Boss" Mapupuno like?"

It's been a year since we saw the President on his first day of office here in MSU, and we've been with him on a couple of work-related travels so we think we can venture to give a good answer to this.

Many of us have heard of him before, either as the former Dean of the College of Law or as the Provincial Prosecutor of Lanao del Sur, and before his presidency we didn't expect to run the chance to really get acquainted with him as a person. But in the afternoon of March 2022, the changing of the guard happened, and there he was, on Day One, trying to contend with a formidable crowd of well-wishers (who, in their haste and hurry to get close to the new Chief Executive, smashed the PMS Director's desk). Our small team had to timidly retreat behind the glass walls of our small office nook.

On his first flag ceremony as University president, where two of us helped facilitate the program as master of ceremonies and giver of the invocation, we all saw him become emotional as he started to speak, saying that his own father, the late Atty. Oga Mapupuno, would have been very proud to see him in that moment. He received applause for his short, simple, heartfelt speech where he expressed his commitment to bringing back MSU on the right track (he admitted that he didn't write a draft so it was clear that he spoke from the heart instead). Later, he met us at a meeting in the conference room that same day, an indication that he meant business.

And he did mean business. We didn't remember, in all our years of serving a University President, being this busy. Documents had to be written, proofread, and signed, committees created and meetings held, speeches and messages had to be written, proofread, and sometimes video recorded, among a multitude of other things. It would set the tone of how the office would be run for the whole year, and possibly the next ones. But we were always glad to serve.

To anyone meeting the Boss for the first time, he might seem imposing, even intimidating, and yes, he could be stern when the occasion demands it, but a warm pleasantness is in his demeanor. He sometimes surprised us, especially in the early months of his term, by coming to work through the usual office entrance and not the small, private one reserved just for him. And every time he passes by our small workspace, he always waves hello to anyone of us who might happen to be there.

As the highest official in the University, and as a former Provincial Prosecutor, the Boss is no stranger to long hours of hard work and as his team, that meant some of us get to stay long past working hours due to some urgent tasks requiring his authorization or signature. At times, work even follows us home. He has an amazingly photographic memory that serves him well when the occasion warrants it. Besides this, he has a gift for carefully communicating and listening, skills requisite to good leadership. However, once he decides on something, it is absolutely final. And woe betide anyone who runs the misfortune of encountering his mercurial temper.

In spite of his hectic schedule, President Mapupuno has a life outside his working hours. Like most Filipinos, he has this ability to belt out a few old songs on the videoke, one of which is "Handyman" by James Taylor. He takes time to catch up on golf every now and then. Coffee is his lifeline, and whenever he is looked for, his aides would answer more often than not, "nagka-kape". Once, at Starbucks in Cebu late one night, he joined us for a while where we were seated, and it was a treat to spend some quality time with him. He also has quite a sense of humor and we've seen his booming laughter in his lightest of moods; and being with him for almost a year, we even have a few inside jokes.

And perhaps it is also fitting to say that while the tasks associated with being special assistants and closely associated staff to him can be quite tedious, even bordering on the insane (one of us had to wake the Boss at 2 AM to report an urgent problem, and once, another one of us had to write a short speech for him---- thirty minutes before he delivered it on video), he never misses to show and tell that we are appreciated for the work that we do for him and MSU, and there's almost always a box of pasalubong waiting for us whenever he returns from some of his work-related trips. The frequent presence of the few boxes of delectable ensaymada or some other goodies from the Boss or even a few minutes from him right within our small office enclosure is a testament to this.

So there you have it our humble insider view of President Basari D. Mapupuno as a boss in the first year of his presidency. We are indeed blessed to work for Boss towards his vision of One MSU, and here's to more meaningful moments and memories with him.

# Malong: A treasured Tradition

Malong is a traditional garment worn by Meranaws. It is typically made from solid-colored cotton or silk fabric, and is usually decorated with intricate designs and patterns like okir and langkit. The garment is usually worn by both men and women, and it is believed to have many functions.

Because of this, the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center took the effort through its School for the Living Tradition program on Kapamalong (the proper ways of wearing the malong for Meranaw Women). This program was inspired by the fact that Meranaws today, especially the youth have seldom used the Malong and might not have seen the proper ways and functions of its use.

The said program started on January 18 and the series of schedule is still in progress at the center. This SLT program is among the many projects implemented in the center, and is supported by the Office of MP Marjanie Macasalong, a member of the parliament of the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM).

For this program, the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center is hoping to start preserving the traditional garments and their uses for the Meranaw people and the popularization for other cultural enthusiasts to appreciate.

Indeed, the School for the Living Tradition program on Kapamalong is an important effort to make sure that the proper ways of wearing malong are taught to the Meranaw youth. With MSU and its partners' continued support, we can ensure that the Meranaw people and culture remain strong for generations to come.







"Langilaw" is published by the Japan Foundation Manila and translated in three languages - English, Japanese, at Vietnamese.

Every year, her book "Salamin At Iba Pang Panglaw" is always part of the Manila International Book Fair. It has become one of the 5 Finalists for the Best Book of Short Fiction in Filipino in the National Book Awards in 2019, while it became Top 3 Finalist in the Filipino Readers' Choice Awards in 2022.

For her contribution in the book "Songs Sprung From Native Soils" where Mindangoan writers like her were interviewed about their experiences in their families, writing and challenges as writers, it had won the "Best Book of Literary History in English" in the National Book Awards in 2022.





As an academician, Almayrah Abbas Tiburon has a strong educational background, which includes a Doctor of Philosophy in Filipino Major in Language and Literature from Mindanao State Universitylligan Institute of Technology (MSU-IIT) which she completed in June 2019. Prior to this, she earned her Master in Filipino (MAFIL) from Mindanao State University (MSU) in Marawi City in December 2009. She also took some units in Master in Public Administration (MPA) in her early years in MSU. Furthermore, she completed her Bachelor of Arts Major in Filipino from MSU, Marawi City in December of 2004. She received her Secondary Diploma from Jamiatul Philippines Al-Islamia in Marawi City in March 1999 and her Elementary Diploma from Amai Pakpak Central Elementary School in Marawi City in March 1994. Tiburon has a strong commitment to education and has worked hard to achieve these impressive accomplishments.

Aside from being a successful writer, she is a mother. She is a proud Meranaw woman.

"Bilang Meranaw, malaya ko pong ipinapakilala at binubuksan ang napakadakila, napakamasining, at napakamakasaysayan nating kultura sa iba't ibang akdang tunay na magpapalawak sa isipan at pangunawa," [As a Meranaw, I freely introduce and pave the way for our great, artistic, and historical culture in various works that will truly expand the mind and understanding of others], she said this with a strong conviction.


As a woman, her take on the power of language is something to ponder on. "Naniniwala rin po akong iba ang lente at haplos ng damdamin mula sa punto de bista ng isang babae lalo na't iilan lamang sa atin ang nagagawang ilantad ang opinyon sa mga bagaybagay sa anumang pagkakataon. Wala nang mas sasakit pa sa pagiging hindi malaya ngunit ganun naman ang ligayang dala ng damdamin kung ito ay nailalabas." [I also believe that the lens and touch of emotion is different from a woman's point of view, especially since only a few of us are able to expose our opinion on things at any time. There is nothing more painful than not being free but so is the joy brought by feelings if they are released], she inspiringly added.

Indeed, Dr. Almayrah has a bright future ahead of her, and her colleagues in MSU look forward to seeing what else she has in store for us. With her knack for storytelling and her passion for writing, there's no telling what she will create next.






















Mindanao Harvest Book 4 won Best Anthology in English during National Book Awards 2022

Mapupuno as he welcomed the guests, presenters, and participants during the opening program of Ongangen ko Inged a Ranaw (OKIR) Conference 2023.

The Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center organized the first ever conference that captures interesting themes involving Meranaw research studies through Ongangen ko Inged a Ranaw (OKIR) Conference 2023 on February 22-23, 2023 at the Kalimudan Hall, Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center, Mindanao State University, Marawi City.

Dr. Analyn Salvador-Amores, the second keynote speaker, shared through video presentation what she and her team in UP Baguio and Museo de Kordilyera were doing to preserve traditional weaving designs through their project called CordiTEX, a project which promotes the digitization of extant traditional textiles.

After the keynote speeches, there was a panel discussion with the five invited Meranaw leaders who shared their ideas and efforts to maintain the preservation of Meranaw Culture. These five discussants in the names of Board Member Jamil Faisal S. Adiong, Sultan Abdul Hamidullah T. Atar, Bai A Labi Sittie Aishah Baicon Cayongcat-Nuska, Bae A Labi Soraidah M. Sabdullah, and Forester Asmari M. Labao, highlighted their own respective projects and programs to uplift and preserve Meranaw culture and identity.


Parallel sessions were held in the afternoon and several presenters from Marawi City and Iligan City presented their research papers that tackle several intriguing issues about Meranaw culture.

Attended by the MSU System officials, MSU Board of Regents, university officials and constituents, students, and quests, Mindanao State University at Naawan Chancellor, Dr. Elnor C. Roa, delivered her State of the University Address on February 2, 2023 at the Training and Students Activity Center of MSU at Naawan.

Chancellor Roa started her reian as the Chancellor in July 2018. Recollecting how she started, Chancellor Roa recalled her promise to anchor her leadership to the qualities of transparency, accountability, participatory, and predictability. In her speech, she enumerated three strategies that she used to realize what she has promised: 1) empower the people, 2) streamline the services and processes, and 3) change the landscape.

When the administration changed as she became the Chancellor, she expressed her gratitude to the university constituents who embraced the change with her. In the past, there was only 1 Vice Chancellor. To date, 4 Vice Chancellors are rallying with her: the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the Vice Chancellor for Administration and Finance, the Vice Chancellor for Research and Extension, and the Vice Chancellor for Planning and Development.

Of the many things that Chancellor Roa mentioned during her SUA, she emphasized that over the last five years, the university has a total of 43 staff and 73 faculty that are appointed and promoted resulting to the increase

of the university's NBC 308 from 2 million to 3.265 million pesos.

Chancellor Roa also mentioned the digitization processes that the university is undertaking. Because the university was granted 1B for its Digital Transformation and Literacy Systems Development this year, the university is starting its transformation of becoming a smart and digitized campus. Part of the university's overall Information Systems Strategic Plan (ISSP) is to establish a Modular Data Center, Fiber Optic Routing and Installations, 4 story Digital Hub, smart classrooms, and e-laboratories that all the university constituents can make use of.

university in research and education in the Philippines, Chancellor Roa happily announced that the internationalization efforts of the university have led MSU at Naawan to have international partners in Malaysia, Vietnam, Thailand, Myanmar, Cambodia, Laos, Russia, Japan, Australia, United States of America, and Turkey.

The Shari'ah Center abides and advocates the wisdom behind the principles of leadership in the holy Qur'an, as Allah said;

﴿ فَيِمَا رَحْمَةٍ مِنَ اللَّهِ لِنْتَ لَهُمْ وَلَوْ كُنْتَ فَظًا غَلِيظُ الْقَلْبِ لَانْفَضُّوا مِنْ حَوْلِكَ فَاعْفُ عَنْهُمْ وَاسْتَغْفِرْ لَهُمْ وَشَاوِرُهُمْ فِي الْأَمْرِ فَإِذَا عَرَمْتَ فَتَوَكَّلُ عَلَى اللَّهِ إِنَّ اللّهَ يُحِبُّ الْمُتَوَكِّينَ﴾

In English translation: "It is part of Mercy of Allah that you do deal gently with them. Were you severe harsh-hearted, they would have broken away from about you: so pass over their faults and ask for Allah's forgiveness for them and consult them in affairs. Then when you have taken a decision, put your trust in Allah. For Allah loves those who put their trust in him." (Holy Qur'an, 3:159)

With the above guidance, the MSU Shari'ah Center under the stewardship of acting Director Aleem Anwar M. Radiamoda, Ph.D., Sh.L. aims to perform its function with excellence as it is guided by its thrust and mandate.

In the center, Education and Tarbiyyah are important major activities in understanding aspects of Islamic life. One great way to learn more about the Shari'ah center is to take part in a Shari'ah Bar Review Program, offered in both Arabic and English. Similarly, seminars on Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) can be helpful for learning how to resolve conflicts in an Islamic way, while peace education from an Islamic perspective can help foster understanding and respect.

Additionally, in the center, Gender Equity and Gender Based Violence in Islamic Perspective is a vital topic for understanding and upholding Islamic values. Islamic Microfinance and Islamic Finance are also important lectures delivered to ensure that economic transactions are conducted according to Islamic principles. Lectures on Islam and Islamic Law, on the other hand, can provide valuable insight into the core tenets of the religion.

Finally, in the center national and international linkages are forwarded to help build bridges between communities here and outside the University.

Further, for our Community Extension Services, activities are designed to help create a healthier and more peaceful community. The center provides a regular radio program for peace, development, and Shari'ah advocacy. We also offer a Shari'ah Legal Clinic, to help provide legal advice and services in accordance with Islamic law.

Every Friday, the center provides Khutbah, or sermon, to help spread knowledge of Islam. We also provide mediation and conflict resolution services in Islam, as well as support BARMM in their mission of moral governance.

Furthermore, we offer peace advocacy through seminars and training. All of these services combine to help create a peaceful, safe, and prosperous community.

These above mentioned activities are backed up by related researches in Islam and Islamic Law before any activity implementation.

# **Ahmad and Abdul in National Film Competition**



# Capturing Hearts through the Meranaw Word of the Day


The birth of the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center (MCHC) in Mindanao State University Main Campus in June 2020 through BOR Resolution No. 18, series of 2020 has brought light and gratification to the lives of the Meranaw people as it has given us the opportunity to learn, unlearn, relearn, and understand better our language, culture and arts, traditions, and our society in general. Under the headship of the active and empowered Meranaw woman, Director Sorhaila Latip-Yusoph, we were able to come up with several relevant programs to fulfill the mandates of the Office even though that was during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic that caused delays and disruptions to our day-to-day activities and forced us to be confined at our respective homes. Among the first programs that the Center initiated was the Meranaw Word of the Day under the Meranaw Language Program (MLP) which was spearheaded by yours truly, together with my team, Prof. Rocaira R. Gumal, Dr. Sharifa K. Masorong, and Prof. Suhainah Tamano.

The Meranaw Word of the Day, which started in July 2020 was first published through the Facebook Page of the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center, and it has primarily been designed to provide a convenient platform to our friends, relatives, family members, and the Meranaw community in general, to be reminded of how beautiful our language is and be introduced of some Meranaw words and their meanings. It has also been intended for our non-Meranaw friends and colleagues especially those who dwell in Lanao del Sur and Lanao del Norte in order that they may learn and understand our language, which can somehow facilitate effective communication thereby preventing misunderstandings and miscommunications. Most importantly, the program has been a meaningful response to the profound need to educate our Meranaw youngsters about their own language as some of them do not even know how to speak their native language. Besides, although the Meranaw language has already been taught in schools under the Mother Tongue Based MultiLingual Education (MTB-MLE), there is a dearth of materials that teachers and learners can use; hence, the materials used in this program can also serve as supplemental resources for the learners, parents, teachers, material developers, and even researchers, especially that the standardized orthography of the language has not yet been fully completed and presented to the public.

It is noteworthy to mention that during the onset of the program, the netizens- both Meranaw and non-Meranaw, were altogether amazed and gratified upon seeing such exceptional post on social media that promotes understanding and appreciation of the Meranaw language. In fact, the first Meranaw word posted on Facebook on July 4, 2020, which is 'Malangas,' a Meranaw adjective that means having a smiling face, friendly, or cheerful, gained innumerable likes, comments, and appreciation online, and was shared almost a hundred times during its first day!Affirmative comments included the netizens' expressions of thankfulness, agreement, and felicitations to the MCHC team for coming up with such a wonderful program; other comments were wishes and aspirations for its sustainability, while few suggested things that can improve the program. The MLP team responded positively to all the comments and suggestions provided. To provide the public with a hard copy of the summary of the Meranaw words used, the first three hundred sixty-five (365) words posted on FB were featured in the RinaRinaw 1: Book of Daily Words and Poems, published by MCHC in 2021.

Moreover, with our desire to provide our audience with a more enhanced and better presentation of the Daily Words posted online, our MLP team presented the Meranaw Word of Day in a multimodal presentation, that is, we added a voice over so that learners can hear how the words are pronounced. Such innovation generated positive responses from the netizens, particularly the non-Meranaw learners as they can already figure out how the Meranaw language is pronounced and spoken. Thanks to my team, Prof. Jamayesha Hadji Jamil, Mohammad Ryan Diamla, Prof. Anifa Alonto, Prof. Norjannah Hadji Socor, and other MLP members for the continuous support to the program. Hopefully, other Meranaw words already posted will also be published in other books that will be produced by the MCHC.

Indeed, the Meranaw Word of the Day has captured the hearts of the netizens and it has become a fascinating and noteworthy pastime for everyone! We therefore made a solemn promise to continue such a wonderful and meaningful program! Sanggibo Salamat, manga pagariya!

Mapupuno, who issued the Memorandum No. 115-OP, Series of 2023, the program was realized through the conduct of the First Seminar-Workshop on News Writing and Information Literacy on January 10, 12, and 16, 2023 at the Kalimudan Hall, Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center. The event commenced with the interesting stories shared by the participants about their shoes as a way to know each other.

OIPP Director, Prof. Sorhaila L Latip-Yusoph, PhD, who is the brain and initiator of the program, was the sole resource person. She discussed the fundamentals of news writing including its ABCs (Accuracy, Brevity, and Clarity) and the 5Ws and H (What, Who, When, Where, Why, and How). She also gave some important tips and techniques on news development especially in identifying the right story angle. At the same time, she inspired everyone to be responsible information users by knowing the importance of determining fake information that lead to information disorders such as misinformation, disinformation, and malinformation. These were then put in to practice by the participants by formulating their own news articles that were presented and evaluated during the plenary session in the afternoon.

The program continued with the Feature Writing Empowerment Seminar-Workshop held on February 9 and 10, 2023. One of the resource persons was Jahara A. Solaiman, a faculty member from the English Department of the College of Social Sciences and Humanities in MSU-Marawi and Special Assistant to the MSU-OP. Her discussion that focused on the characteristics and structure of feature articles urged the participants to craft creative and compelling stories. In the afternoon, Prof. Latip-Yusoph gave some inputs on proper way of constructing feature articles. She also boosted the confidence of the participants by encouraging them to cease fearing writing and let their imagination emerge, which also resulted to the innovative and informative feature articles they produced during the workshop. One of the articles produced was entitled "The Aesthetic Wearing of Hijab."

Participants who thrived and completed the activities were named as Information Officers of their respective offices. Furthermore, a OneMSU link was formulated to ensure that there is a clear and concise communication among the diverse units of MSU and that only factual information are being conveyed to the public.

This empowerment program is just among the efforts and initiatives of OIPP in supporting the University to fulfill its vision of being the center of excellence in its three key areas such as Instruction, Research, and Extension. With its new pilot, OIPP will continue to serve MSU as its voice and one of its wings in its quest of soaring high and maintaining it to the rostrum of top-notch universities that provide holistic quality education and services.

# Harnessing Systemness: MSU Academic Summit

Chancellor Alizedney Ditucalan opened the first MSU system-wide Academic Summit with a message that set the stage for the three-day event.

"This is the first time that such an assembly is dedicated to the review and revision of our academic policies. This is the first time that all thirteen campuses of the Mindanao State University articulate in both vision and action, One MSU," said Chancellor Ditucalan.

The summit, which was held at the gymnasium on November 28-30, 2022, brought together the members of the MSU Board of Regents, MSU System officials, and academic heads of the various MSU campuses to share insights and experiences that relate to academic concerns of the university.

"This summit provides us an opportunity to find the most effective ways to collaborate in finding solutions to the issues and challenges currently facing the System and its thirteen component campuses," the Chancellor remarked.

"Within these three days, we shall be furthering a consultative agenda. The proposals that emanate from our discussions shall be the basis for the drafting of more responsive policies. They shall constitute the framework from which we build stronger academic programs in the next five years," he added.

MSU President Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno, in his inspirational message, emphasized the need for systemness to strengthen public higher education in Mindanao.

"The time is ripe for a revisit or review of our policies. This revisit is rendered compelling and urgent by the new leadership's watchword or catchphrase: ONE MSU. We move in our desired direction, toward the same goal, as ONE MSU," said President Mapupuno.

The concept afforded the various MSU campuses the opportunity to emphasize their power as a unit while also adapting to fully utilize the different specializations in conjunction with each other.

President Basari also urged the campus leaders and participants to see the value of systemness.

"We operate as a System governed by the same Code or Charter. Fragmentation of the System is a possibility we shall never contemplate nor countenance. But I hasten to add, with enough elbow room for the individual aspirations or growth plans of the other members of the System," he said.

The lawyer-president said that "issues or problems of academe are legion." He said he has doubts that everything can be tackled in the said Academic Summit.

"We might need a sequel to this. Or even a series – whatever it takes to achieve our objectives. But by gathering here, today, at this Summit, and rolling up our sleeves, and getting down to serious work, as ONE MSU, there is no reason we cannot accomplish what we set out to accomplish."

With more than 300 people who registered for the summit, the summit's objectives were reached as the participants contributed collectively to benefit students, faculty and stakeholders that they serve.

The theme of systemness permeated throughout the three-day summit. In addition to the academic heads, MSU-IIT, host campus of the summit, invited the following experts to deliver plenary talks on each of the six pillars: Dr. Dennis Alonzo (University of New South Wales, Australia) on Faculty Recruitment and Development; Dr. Arnel Onesimo Uy (De La Salle University, Philippines) on Learning Outcomes and Assessments; Mr. Johnson Ong Chee Bin (Education Quality International, Singapore) onTeaching and Learning; Dr. Edizon Fermin (National Teachers College, Philippines) on Undergraduate and Graduate Programs; Dr. Satria Bijaksana (Institut Teknologi Bandung, Indonesia) on Student Support Services; and MSU-IIT's Vice Chancellor for Planning and Development, Dr. Pamela Resurreccion, on Quality Assurance.

After each of the plenary talks was an open forum that allowed participants to be more engaged in the summit. The summit featured an expert on digital learning environments as its keynote speaker, Dr. Hanna Teräs, a Principal Lecturer at the School of Professional Teacher Education at Tampere University of Applied Sciences in Finland. Her talk touched on navigating the postpandemic world of education.

Dr. Teräs shared thoughts about the ways forward from the unprecedented situation that education is facing, especially because of the pandemic. She said that it is the best time to gather, like the summit, "to reassess where we have come from, and establish some targets where it is that we want to go with education. How can we improve and what is the desired future for us?"

Day 2 of the summit featured workshops on the six pillars. The workshop venues were buzzing as participants worked together. The workshop design provided by the facilitators allowed participants to discover and identify problems, prioritize which problems need to be addressed, and design solutions to identified problems. Each workshop session produced the following proposals crafted by the participants:

# MSU-Maguindanao Serving Humanity through R&E

True to the University's commitment to providing relevant research and extension (R&E) services, the Department of Science and Technology allocated PHP 19.945 million to MSU-Maguindanao's R&E services. This is in line with MSU-Maguindanao's mandate to help improve the living conditions of the Bangsamoro through innovation and rural development.

As implementing agency of the DOST-PCAARRD funded projects, the Adoption of Improved Commercial-Scale Mangrove Crab Hatchery-Nursery System that is situated in Parang, Maguindanao led by Dr. Ramjie Y. Odin. This is in response to revitalize the crab industry in Mindanao and to promote sustainable development for the fisheries sector.

A training on Mangrove Crab Nursery and Grow-out Operations was conducted last October 21-28, 2022. The attendees were sixty-two (62) who are former combatants, those who own or lease ponds, willing to invest in the operations, and with interest in mangrove crab farming from different parts of Maguindanao chosen by the Local Government Unit (LGU) of Parang Municipality and Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries, and Agrarian Reform – Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao (MAFAR-BARMM). The said training aimed to capacitate the stakeholders and adopters on the mangrove crab commercial-scale refined technologies.

On the other hand, the Implementation of S&T-based Climate Smart Soil and Water Management in the Highlands of Maguindanao in collaboration with Asian Institute of Technology (AIT) in Thailand headed by Dr. Raquel D. Santiago-Arenas aims to build and strengthen the resiliency of upland farming systems to adapt to climate change and develop strategies in mainstreaming soil and water technologies.

Recent trainings include a capacity building to twenty-five (25) active highland farmers from South Upi, Maguindanao to share and deploy S&T-based highland conservation and management practices to transform Maguindanao highlands into a climate smart highland agriculture. Another training workshop was on Basic Hydroponics for Growing High-value Crops and Soil and Water Management and Technologies for Highland Agriculture was pioneered to train and equip the mentioned key players. These training workshops took place on October 19-23, 2022 at Organi Kian Urban Farm, Koronadal City, and Sunrise Garden Lake Resort, Lake Sebu, South Cotabato.

Further, both projects have secured Certificate of Copyright Registrations issued by Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines (IPPHL)/National Library Office of the Philippines (NPL) on September 13, 2022 to ensure the legal protection of the University on the ownership of the project's output such as booklets, pamphlets, manuals, and other form of writings. This registration is in line with the Intellectual Property Policy of the Philippines and IP Policy of MSU-Maguindanao with BOR Resolution No.116 s. 2022.

In addition, the research project on Population Assessment, Initial Reproductive Performance and Offspring Quality of Giant Freshwater Prawn (Machrobrachium rosenbergii) Broodstock from Ligawasan Marsh, Philippines led by Mr. Ryan V. Fabay will be the basis of the broodstock for hatchery operations of Macrobrachium rosenbergii which could be the source of breeders in the future. Presently, the project team is gathering data from its designated project sites, namely, Dalican, Datu Odin Sinsuat, Maguindanao; Lala, Lanao del Norte; and Naawan, Misamis Oriental. This is also in collaboration with MSU at Naawan.

The outcomes of these R&E have led MSU-Maguindanao in crafting its Farmers' Academy. The mission of the Farmers' Academy is to develop local innovative farmers through enhanced entrepreneurial skills thereby sustaining food security and economic self-sufficiency and resiliency.

### A Third Sider Series

This said project opened opportunities for the University in its preparation for integrating the concept of peace and development in the curriculum of the basic education in congruence with the upcoming national policy.

The first series of this partnership was held last December 12, 2022 at the Kalimudan Hall, Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center with student leaders from University Training Center, MSU Senior High School, and MSU Balindong Community High School as participants.

"The youth must shine like a diamond," said Dr. Latiph in his welcome remarks. This is a way to inspire the youth of today.

Other NCMF representatives and facilitators were Amoran Batara Jr. and Dr. Anisa Mapupuno-Laguindab. From the IPDM were Mohammad Sharief and Dir. Aliah P. Cali-Pascan who helped in facilitating activities and peace reminders for the role of the youth in the society, respectively.

# **Writing Our Own Story**

It was an opportunity that presented itself which I was quick to say yes to. I was invited last year to take part in a folk story writing workshop for English teachers which ran from September 9 to 10, 2022. It was a joint project between Mindanao State University-Marawi and Universitas Tanjung Pura in Indonesia. Two things drew me to take part in the event, learning the skill of folk story writing and the expected final output of the workshop—an original composition of a folk story.

The workshop was a delightful awakening of sorts of listening to memories of the participants of folk stories they grew up listening to and the realization that this particular genre of story writing is slowly becoming lost in the current generation inclined to entertainment dependent on technology. In the discussions during the workshop, focus was given on how folk stories are a great vehicle for imparting and preserving many elements of culture. The talk drove home the importance of sustaining the craft of folk story writing as this is also the means of ensuring that the norms and traditions of a culture are continually being passed down to succeeding generations.

We were most fortunate to have professors from the two sponsoring universities to enlighten us about different aspects of writing, of culture, and even of the usage of folk stories as instructional material in our English classes. From MSU, we had Dr. Rebekka Alawi, Dr. Sorhaila L. Latip-Yusoph, Dr. Godiva Eviota, and Prof. Pearle Jun Franco to give us the talks, and from Universitas Tanjung Pura, we had Dr. Ikhsan Ikhsanuddin. It was a pool of experts that provided the cerebral impetus for us to fully grasp what folk story writing is and be inspired to become potential writers of the genre. But the event would not have come to fruition without the efforts of Dr. Grace Rafal who was the point person of MSU for this joint project with Universitas Tanjung Pura.

All twelve participants, who were members of different ethnic groups within Mindanao, were encouraged to write and submit a folk story that would exhibit elements of their respective cultures. The task was to be completed exactly two weeks from the day of the conclusion of the workshop. The folk story had to be written in both English and Filipino, and must be an original composition. Five stories from among the entries would be selected and a cash price to be awarded to each. As an additional incentive, the five winning entries would be published in the journal of the Universitas Tanjung Pura in Indonesia.

It took a little over a month for the results of the folk story writing contest to be announced. As my story was one of the entries, you can just imagine the anxiety experienced from waiting for the reveal. The final results honestly took me by surprise. I did not expect that my story would be unanimously chosen by the judges as the top entry. It was a moment of pride not only for what I had accomplished personally, but moreover for the idea that a story that I have written that wonderfully reflects my Meranaw culture will be read by Indonesians who may know little or nothing at all about the Meranaw people and our ways.

It may be a minute achievement but I perceive it as one that can be potentially impactful if it will encourage others to also begin writing stories about their own identity, creating a literary tapestry of their own story.

Below is my winning entry. I hope that you will find delight in reading it as much as it gave me joy in penning it.

### The Datu's Precious Gift

In a faraway land, in one of the  $Pat\ a\ Phangampong\ a\ Ranao^1$ , lived a bai  $a\ labi^2$  who was known throughout the land for her exceptional character and peerless beauty. As she was the only daughter of the Sulutan<sup>3</sup> of Mala a Bayabaw<sup>4</sup>, not just anyone could ask for her hand in marriage. The Sulutan wanted the finest partner for his precious daughter who had come of age, so he gathered the local datus<sup>5</sup> and elders in the land for the best possible way to find a suitable husband.

The meeting took days with various suggestions from those present. On the third day they were finally able to reach a consensus. All eligible sons of other sulutans in the Pat a Phangampong a Ranao would be invited to Mala a Bayabaw so that the Sulutan and the local datus could personally engage with the potential contenders for the hand of the bai a labi.

An announcement was handed to all the royal houses in Ranao. Interested sons of sulutans must arrive at Mala a Bayabaw within ten days where they would be met at the entry road to Mala a Bayabaw by a special entourage of local warriors to accompany them to the  $torogan^6$  of the Sulutan. The other conditions were, they had to travel without a companion and they had to bring one precious gift for the bai a labi.

The day came and four charming datus, sons of sulutans, from the different royal houses of the Pat a Phangampong a Ranao and distinguished by their unique kopiya<sup>7</sup> and resplendent attires, arrived successfully. News came that ten other datus had returned to their respective lands, not being able to survive the grueling travel unattended by servants.

The small entourage of esteemed local warriors welcomed the four datus and requested them to take a short rest before continuing to the torogan of the Sulutan, which was still half a day away by foot. The local warriors prepared a simple meal and the datus were asked by the head warrior to be seated with them. Three of the datus refused to take any food in the company of the warriors. They insisted on being served separately and only among their fellow datus. Without hesitation their request was granted.

When noon came, the head warrior asked if the datus would like to make a stop for dhuhr<sup>8</sup> before proceeding with their travel. Most responded in the affirmative. But after learning that the stream where they would make ablution was quite distant, suddenly there were complaints of weariness from the datus. Only one of them went with the warriors for cleansing and joined them in prayer after.

Following dhuhr, the datus proceeded by horse on their journey. Small talk between and among the datus could be heard. They shared how awed they were by the immense land of Mala a Bayabaw, its abundant plantation, herds of animals, and its majestic view of the lake and surrounding mountains. They all could hardly contain their excitement at the prospect of living in this vast land of plenty.

As the entourage neared the torogan, they saw a lady dressed shabbily, carrying a sack of rice on her back with difficulty. At once one of the datus got off his horse and agilely transferred the sack onto the back of his stallion. Despite the lady's insistence that she could manage without help, the datu was adamant. He asked the lady, who kept her eyes averted and not meeting the gaze of the datu, where she was heading. The lady, momentarily disconcerted, said that she was going to the torogan of the Sulutan. The datu was pleased to hear this and told her that it was to both their convenience as they had a common destination.

When the majestic torogan was at last in sight, and the entourage of warriors and the datus could be seen from the window of the torogan, sudden sounds of the *kolintang*<sup>9</sup> and the *debaka*<sup>10</sup> melodically filled the air. For the datus, it was the biggest torogan they had ever seen and the most intricately carved *panolong* <sup>11</sup> they have laid eyes on. They were impressed by the magnificence of the Sulutan's torogan.

As the datus were escorted by the warriors into a beautiful canopy with lovely decorated  $talam^{12}$  laid on matted floors, they could not help but feel immediate hunger from the aromatic scent of food that filled each talam. They were asked to be seated while waiting for the arrival of the Sulutan. Music continued to be played in the background but this time accompanied by the traditional dance of *kapagapir*<sup>13</sup> by graceful female dancers.

As they were being entertained, their eyes became riveted on the arrival of the most captivating bai a labi they have ever laid sight on. The latter was accompanied by someone who looked oddly familiar. They all soon realized that it was the head warrior of the entourage that received them, but this time looking very regal. To their utter bewilderment, he was introduced as the Sulutan of Mala a Bayabaw.

He welcomed the four datus with such eloquence befitting only a sulutan. He expressed his appreciation and gratitude for their presence and acceptance of his invitation. The Sulutan emphasized that their lineage and wealth alone made them all suitable partners for his daughter. He continued to say that although these qualities may suffice for other fathers, it is not for his beloved princess.

The Sulutan disclosed that he purposefully wanted the datus to travel without servants from their land of origin to see how self-sufficient they were. Next, he wanted to see who among them displayed humility, thus asking them to share a meal with the warriors. As a Muslim he had to observe the dhuhr prayer, which gave him an opportunity to see who among them were steadfast in observing their prayers. The last observation came with the lady carrying a sack of rice. Then right at that moment, the breathtaking bai a labi stood up.

She introduced herself using the most gentle of words and softest of tones while covering her mouth as tradition dictates. She expressed her gratitude to the datu who assisted her in carrying the sack of rice and revealed that she is actually the daughter of the Sulutan, the one to be married to the datu that will be chosen. This and the other revelations stunned the datus even more.

The Sulutan spoke again. He asked for each of the datus to bring forth what he requested from each of them to bring, a precious gift for the bai a labi.

The first datu brought forth a bedazzling gold bracelet. He explained that it was from the jewelry collection of his mother and that if he is chosen, he would have more to give to her among other riches.

The second datu said he himself is the precious gift to the bai a labi, as he is the most handsome man in all of the Pat a Phangampong a Ranao, and that together, they can have beautiful and handsome offspring.

The third datu presented a *salsila* as his gift. He said that among all the eligible sons of sulutans in the Pat a Phangampong a Ranao, he comes from the most powerful and well-known lineage. If chosen, he asserts that he can bring more stability to Mala a Bayabaw.

The fourth and last datu had in hand something covered in a gorgeous  $landap^{15}$ . He said it is the oldest and most precious possession of his family. Inside was a  $Qur'an^{16}$  that has surely seen many centuries. He said that it is his wish and that of his ancestors to continue a lineage of God-fearing servants of Allah and that he hopes his gift will be accepted by a lady whose values are the same.

The Sulutan rose from his seat and said, "By the gifts that you have brought, it has been made vividly clear to me who is the most deserving of my beloved princess. I have chosen the datu who exemplified best the qualities of a Muslim: self-sufficient; humble; pious; and helpful."

The Sulutan further explained that Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) states that if a man whose religion and character satisfies you and proposes marriage, he should be accepted (Sunan Al-Tirmidhi, 1084). It is for this reason, with the consent of the bai a labi, that he will accept the offer of marriage of the only datu who passed all the five tests.

The bai a labi and the datu were married in the simplest of ceremonies but enjoyed the grandeur of governing vast lands in peace and prosperity, guided by the most precious gift given to the bai a labi by the datu many odd years ago: the Qur'an.

End note:

The writer, Anifa Alonto, took inspiration from the Meranaw folk stories which always gave voice and significance to women in their narratives. With this story she also wanted to pay homage to her ancestors from her paternal side who come from Mala a Bayabaw and bring to the forefront as well the influence Islam had on the perception, attitude, and ways of Meranaws.

The University Business Office (UBO) is committed to providing outstanding financial services to both our students and the university. Its goals are to enable all university revenue-generating departments to collect tuition and other university income. Its goal is to manage student accounts, accurately and efficiently collect university fees. The office aims to provide first-rate constituent care, as it adheres to all university policies. The office gives all revenue-generating divisions of the university the ability to collect fees and other university revenues and to help the MSU system get back on the right track.

Upon taking the helm of the UBO Director position on August 19, 2022, Director Muhammad Zuhair L. Gani, CPA has prioritized carrying out the duties assigned to him by MSU System President, Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno. Since then, the MSU UBO's collections have seen a considerable increase, especially compared to the year prior.

The office has achieved a number of impressive accomplishments

in the past few months. It has requested full lists from collecting colleges, offices, external units, and extensions with their outstanding invoices in the CITC Office, as well as providing a proposed format for said lists. They have also communicated with the Budget Office and CITC to ready for the COST Center. Furthermore, the office has facilitated the request of the complete lists of MSU External Units for the 2022–2023 academic year from the Office of the Assistant Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs (OAVCAA). Furthermore, the office monitors and provides monthly billing statements for MSU renters, such as the Amanah Bank, Land Bank, PNB, and other tenants.

On concerns of having better Income Generating Projects (IGPs), the office along with Former UBO Director Potre A. Macarambon has visited the MSU College of Agriculture to assess the proposals for their IGPs which comprise vegetable farming, broiler chicken production, a dairy goat project, a banana farm plantation (Lakatan), and corn tissue culture.

Further, the UBO leadership strengthen the assigning and instructing employees in checking the IGPs in several colleges including the MSU College of Fisheries, College of Forestry, College of Sports, Physical Education and Recreation, College of Agriculture, and the MSU VIP Lounge.

Recently, the office recommended six proposals for its workplace and services to serve better:

- More effective/modest stand/stall for street vendors/sellers;
- MSU UBO BOR Resolution to amend and improve a fast and better transaction;
- LED SCREEN TVs to educate the campus about the programs and services offered by the MSU System;
- A focus on synchronizing campus efforts to improve access, manage expenses, and boost system-wide productivity;
- Create a professional workforce that is competent and efficient.

As we look ahead, it is important to keep an eye on MSU enrollment and make sure of adequate preparations to accommodate students. Additionally, we need to ensure that our MSU dormitories are in good condition and up to standards. Finally, the office is pleased to announce that a COST CENTER for each of the college and other IGP units will soon be implemented, providing a more efficient and organized approach to budgeting.

# **OVCAA of MSU-Main Campus Gears Towards Academic Excellence**

The Office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs (OVCAA) of the MSU-Main Campus, the leading academic office of the University that is responsible for supporting and fostering new programs, academic transformations and improvements, and for keeping management and guidance in all the academic programs in the University, has spearheaded various relevant academic activities gearing towards the realization of the mandates of the institution to achieve academic excellence not only in Instruction but also in Research and Extension. Since he sat in his Office as Vice Chancellor in June 2022, Dr. Amerkhan G. Cabaro, the former dean of the College of Natural Sciences and Mathematics and former Special Assistant at the OVCAA, vowed to help the University continue its goal for all its academic programs to be accredited and become Centers of Excellence and Development. He utilized and shared his experiences and expertise being an active member of the Committee on Quality Assurance Board (CQUAB), the body that guides the different colleges in terms of accreditation matters, to encourage and assist the various colleges not only to meet and advance their standards as well as promote excellence, but also continuously seek ways to enhance the quality of education and training provided. He then started working harmoniously with the Ministry of Basic, Higher and Technical Education (MBHTE), Bangsamoro Autonomous in Muslim Mindanao (BARMM) for the application of the various programs of the different colleges for the Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) for recognition that the specific degree programs being offered by the University are fully compliant with the policies, standards and guidelines of CHED. In fact, on March 13-17, 2023, the Director General of the Higher Education and his team together with esteemed evaluators from different Universities will be visiting MSU-Main Campus to conduct an evaluation on the first twenty-one (21) degree programs that have already passed the Level 1 accreditation conducted by the AACUP in the previous year. Another twenty-one (21) degree programs that are Level 1 Accredited by AACUP will also undergo the same evaluation process in April 2023. Dr. Cabaro pledged to help the various colleges to turn most if not all of their degree programs into certified and accredited ones.

Further, like the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Chairman and Chairman of the MSU-Board of Regents, Popoy De Vera, VC Cabaro believes that the faculty members are the soul of the University; hence, they should always be heard and be given premium recognition and importance so they can work more effectively and efficiently in maintaining the standards of excellence in the University. This is an advocacy that he has pursued even before becoming the Vice Chancellor and Dean as he was also the former Vice President of the MSU-Marawi Faculty Union. To do this, he made sure that faculty members that deserve to be promoted and be granted permanent tenure will be properly evaluated by the Committees in charge of them. In fact, since he sat at the Office in June, he has already recommended numerous faculty members for Promotion and Grant of Permanent Tenure to the Board of Regents during the October 2022 and December 2002 BOR meetings, and he is determined to help more faculty members be evaluated competently.

Moreover, in effectively performing its functions as the arm of the President in academic matters in the MSU-Main Campus, the OVCAA actively participated in various campus activities such as the Campus-Wide and System-Wide Strategic Planning Activities conducted in July 2022 to articulate its plans for the academic units of the University and the System-Wide Finance Committee in August 2022. It spearheaded the conduct of the Campus-Wide Academic Summit in October 2022 in preparation for the System Wide Academic Summit conducted in November 2022. The Office has also organized the conduct of traditional activities for the faculty and students like the General Convocation and Orientation 2022 and the Crème de la Crème 2022 for the students achievers in the University, not to mention the Pre Commencement and Commencement Exercises which the Office fully supported.

Finally, the OVCAA has submitted several academic proposals to the Academic Planning Committee (APC) and were approved by the Board of Regents. These are the Proposal to set the Qualifications and Functions of a College Department Chairperson, and the Proposal to Comply with the publication requirements of Research Outputs of Graduate Students in both Master's and Doctoral Degree Graduate Programs with Academic Track, Indeed, Vice Chancellor Cabaro affirmed to the University President, Atty, Basari D. Mapupuno that he will give his full support in achieving his Ten Point Agenda as far as Academic Affairs are concerned.

## MSU Law Students Take Oath as Law Student Practitioners

On 25 June 2020, the Supreme Court en banc promulgated Rule 138-A, otherwise known as the Revised Law Student Practice Rule, allowing law students from the Philippines to engage in the limited practice of law through a Clinical Legal Education Program (CLEP). Accordingly, the purpose of this law is to provide law students with opportunities for practical learning that will make them practice-ready even before taking the Bar exam. Before taking the Bar Examinations, it is now required that the Transcript of Records (TOR) must reflect the CLEP courses completed, as a stand-alone course or otherwise.

From the aforementioned Rule itself, CLEP is an experiential, interactive and reflective credit-earning teaching course with the objective of providing law students with practical knowledge, skills and values necessary for the application of the law, delivery of legal services and promotion of social justice and public interest, especially to the marginalized, while inculcating in the students the values of ethical lawyering and public service. In the MSU College of Law, Prof. Atty. Joanah C. Alinog-Disocor serves as the Assistant Dean for CLEP.

To comply with the requirements of this new rule, the first batch of students from the MSU College of Law – Marawi Campus took their oath on 06 September 2022 as Level 1 Law Student Practitioners (LSPs) before Hon. Judge Wenida B. M. Papandayan at the Regional Trial Court of Lanao del Sur. The said students, Ms. Omelkhair G. Basher, Mr. Nurhalim S. Carim, Mr. Abdul Hatta B. Derico, Ms. Aniah D. Dumpa, Ms. Amanah U. Kurangking, Ms. Dayamon P. Macalnas, Ms. Princess Nhahra R. Macapeges, Mr. Norodden A. Macapodi, Ms. Sittie Asheya G. Macasundig, Mr. Abdulcahar S. Mamangconi, Mr. Mahid B. Mangondaya, Ms.

Rohanisa Z. Pangcoga, Ms. Zairene A. Salic, and Ms. Nurul-Izza A. Sangcopan, also served as the pioneering members of the Sambatan Law Clinic which was established in compliance with the objectives of the CLEP.

The second batch of students took their oath on 2022 October 05 while the third batch took oath on 12 January 2023. Pursuant to Section 5, Rule 138-A of the Rules of Court, the Level 1 LSPs are now allowed to interview prospective clients, give legal advice to the client, negotiate for and on behalf of the client, draft legal documents, represent eligible parties before quasi-judicial or administrative bodies, provide public legal orientation, and assist in public interest advocacies for policy formulation and implementation. To date, there are yet to be any applicants for the Level 2 Certification from the College.

As LSPs, the students rendered free legal consultation and notarial services at the Municipality of Balindong on 2022 October 13. In collaboration with Lanao del Sur Provincial Legal Services Office, they also organized a Legal Aid Mission and rendered free legal consultation services for the Persons Deprived of Liberty (PDLs) at the Provincial Jail in Brgy. Tampilong, Marawi City on 10 November 2022.

With the members of the two legal aid clinics of the College of Law, the Sambatan Law Clinic and the MSU Legal Aid Clinic (MSULAC), being fully comprised of duly sworn law student practitioners, the College of Law continues to prosper in the furtherance of its goals of seeking to provide free legal services in the MINSUPALA region for the promotion of social justice and public interest.






