# MSU's Commemoration of the 125th Philippine Independence

Indepedence Day Message by Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno, System President

To our invited distinguished guests, to the University officials, staff from the Administrative and Semi-academic units, faculty and staff from the colleges, mga kababayan, mga kapatid sa ilalim ng iisang bandila, assalamo alaykom warrahmatullahi wabarakatoho, my wholehearted greetings of peace to all of you as we observe our country's 125th Independence Day!

Ikinatutuwa ko na nagkita-kita tayong lahat sa pagkakataon na ito, na nag flag raising tayo sa mismong Araw ng Kalayaan. In the past, we could just expect to let June 12 pass by just like any non-working holiday, or to just join in the festivities for the day that were arranged by the city or provincial government. Now, I believe that it is the university's turn. One of the reasons for having this flag raising ceremony today, even on a national holiday is that, this year's celebration is like no other, because this is our country's 125th anniversary of the declaration of independence from 300 or so years of being colonized by Spain. For this, the National Government has declared that, for the 125th, the celebration will be from this year until 2026, so as make the observance significant and meaningful for the people.

ito. 125 years later, let us take stock of ourselves and ask this question: What have we done with the independence that our forefathers have fought so hard for?

Kalayaan. Freedom. There is so much loaded into such a simple word. Napakaganda ngunit napakalalim din ang kahulugan. Pero ano nga ba ang kalayaan? Independence is not merely freedom from our colonizers and forces that threaten our freedom and sovereignty. Independence, real independence, is also the freedom from our unpatriotic, selfish, self-serving tendencies that have sadly permeated our socio-economic fabric and have adversely affected how this country is doing. Hindi lang yung malaya na tayo sa ating mga kolonisador ang puedeng maging kahulugan ng salitang "kasarinlan"; ito rin po ay nangangahulugan na, upang tayo ay maging ganap at patuloy na malaya bilang mga mamamayang Pilipino, kailangan ay palayain din natin ang ating mga sarili sa mga makasariling gawain at pag-iisip na hindi nakabubuti sa kapakanan ng ating bansa.

Bilang mga kawani at empleyado ng pamahalaan, ang pagiging mapagmahal sa ating bayan ay dapat likas na sa atin. Our being government employees should be a reminder to us of the patriotism that should serve as our compass that will steer us into doing what is right for our nation.

**Kinabukasan.** The Future. We humans have always been inclined to think and talk about the future. Hindi iyan mawawala sa atin, sadyang hitik sa mga ideya at kuro-kuro ang talakayan tuwing pinag-uusapan ang kinabukasan. Pero, nagawa na ba natin yung pag-usapan at pag-isipan ang kinabukasan at kapakanan ng ating bayan?

As Filipinos, it is also our patriotic duty to think about our country's future, and to take steps as citizens to realize that future, a better Philippines for us and for future generations. In simple yet significant ways, we in our daily lives collectively create our country's future. It can be as simple as throwing our garbage in the right places, to having a good work ethic, to exercising our right to vote in the elections. Hence, we must keep in mind that with every act, we are laying the foundations of our motherland's future.

To the students who may be here with us today or who are nearby right now, let us be reminded of Jose Rizal's exhortation to you, the youth: "Ang kabataan ang pag-asa ng bayan." Ang tanging hiling ko lang sa inyo ay, sikapin din ninyo na kayo rin ay maaasahan ng Pilipinas sa darating na panahon, dahil kayo ang magpapatuloy sa mga tamang sinimulan at itatama din niyo ang mga maling nakasanayan, alang-alang sa bayan. YOU are this country's future, and you have the obligation to serve this country to the best of your ability.

**Kasaysayan.** Many people would consider history as just a record of events that happened in the past and nothing more, which would just be set aside. But history is more than that. Our history is not merely confined to the unfurling of the first Filipino flag, nor did with the KKK's tearing up of the cedulas to declare the country's break from Spain. Most certainly, and closer to home, it is not confined to the retelling of the Battle of Bayang, or the Jabidah Massacre. It is more than that.

It cannot be denied that history is being made every day, and it is being made right now as we gather here. We also cannot deny that our history as a people, as a nation, has been turbulent for the most part, from our colonial past to the struggle for the right to self-determination here in Mindanao to the political, societal, and economic turmoil of the present that

seems to have no sign of slowing down. Yet, it is part of our identity, our story. We must not only come to terms with our past, when necessary, we must help change the narrative, because even with our existing histories, there will always be those who will be left out of it. We must make sure that they are heard as well. Certainly, we are also reminded that we must learn from the past in order to efficiently and peacefully navigate towards the future.

Mindanao State University itself is a piece of our country's history. Seen as a solution to the so-called "Mindanao Problem" in the 1960s, MSU has been instrumental not only in giving disadvantaged youths the education they would not otherwise have gotten, but also in helping the island in its struggle to find a long-lasting peace. In its 60 or so years of existence, MSU has also been witness to the darkest parts of our country's history-the Martial Law Years, the Moro struggle, the Marawi Siege, and most recently, the global Covid-19 pandemic. But because of our long-standing tradition of resilience and survival, MSU was able to deal with these quite well. Nothing beats the MSUan spirit!

We have also made history by aspiring to make peace one of every MSU student's required subjects. Our trailblazing Foundations of Peace Education course has made waves in many academic circles and our aspiration to become a National Peace University, the presence of the Institute for Peace and Development in Mindanao and our efforts to preserve local culture, local history through researches and through entities like the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center are proof of how MSU values history and peace. Binibigyan po natin ng halaga ang kasaysayan at kapayapaan dahil ito ay mga susi sa magandang kinabukasan ng Mindanao at ng buong bansa. ### **MENTAL HEALTH:** Be Aware!

Mental health is a state of well-being in which the individual realizes one's own abilities and potentials, copes adequately with the normal stresses of life, displays resilience in the face of extreme life events, works productively and fruitfully, and is able to make a positive contribution to the community.

On the other hand, mental health condition refers to a neurologic or psychiatric condition characterized by the existence of a recognizable, clinically-significant disturbance in an individual's cognition, emotional regulation, or behavior that reflects a genetic or acquired dysfunction in the neurobiological, psychosocial, or developmental processes underlying mental functioning.

The determination of neurologic and psychiatric conditions shall be based on scientifically-accepted medical nomenclature and best available scientific and medical evidence. These two have to be understood and differentiated appropriately in the sense that many, if not all would define mental health as mental illness.

It is very significant that we put weight on recognizing and responding to the mental health needs of every individual, be it a family member, a friend, co-worker, student and the like. Primarily, these unmet and not properly addressed mental health needs can be an impediment to the emotional, social, career and academic development of every student. Not to mention the hurdles and struggles of every parent in facing the daily challenges along their way, each and every single day.

We have to strengthen our awareness on this matter particularly in attending to our students' mental health needs to counter the early warning signs of depression, anxiety and suicide. With equal measure, this applies to every individual, both employee and non-employee who negotiate the high and low tides of life.

Thus, the Guidance Services Specialists from the Guidance and Counseling Section of the Division of Student Affairs are always available to provide essential mental health services as means of intervention for both students and staff who are experiencing and/ or displaying career, social, emotional, and academic setbacks. This includes psychosocial education to enhance awareness of mental health and counseling interventions intended to ensure optimistic mental health and to remove the stigma associated with mental health issues.

### **ASEAN Flags fly for** the first time in MSU

Under the mandate of the International Affairs and Linkages Office and in coordination with the Office of the Campus Protocol, the flag of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) with the respective flags of its 10 member countries were raised simultaneously in a solemn and brief flag raising ceremony held in the MSU Campus for the first time in its 60 years history before the constituency of MSU headed by its officials and personnel.

The event was conducted in the MSU-Main Campus ground on August 19, 2022 after the Flag Ceremony of all MSU personnel. With the ASEAN Song playing in the background, 22 personnel of the Peace Keeping Force (PKF), who trained for a day prior to the event, raised the flags in sync with the song in precise near flawless unison making the occasion truly officious and a landmark moment as all watched the flags splay out in synchrony as each proudly fly high above its polls before the awed audience. The event was capped with all those present performing the ASEAN handshake in a large circle that encompassed the area between the Antonio Isidro Hall and the International Convention Center.

The ASEAN Flags Raising Ceremony heralded the call of MSU System President Basari Dimakuta Mapupuno for a more invigorated internationalization (IZN) program in all MSU campuses in line with his pursuit of making all MSU campuses as a prime research center in the country. IZN is part of the 10-point Agenda of the Mapupuno Administration. It must be understood that IZN is a process that has begun long before in the previous administrations of MSU but it is in this current Administration that IZN is concretized as a mandated Agenda. The activity was a commemoration of the creation of ASEAN, an organization that most campuses of MSU is in close collaboration with through many of its member nations.

The ASEAN Flags now fly high and proud in the Main Campus of Mindanao State University, a reminder of the kind of unity and cooperation System President Basari D. Mapupuno is championing for all campuses of MSU to be under the slogan, "One MSU: No One Gets Left Behind."




The ASEAN Flags in MSU-Marawi with lady officials.



# TikTok as a Learning Tool: Valuable or Not?

TikTok is an immersive application that carries a wide range of information. In fact, the research I conducted, "TikTok as a Learning Tool for Mindanao State University-Marawi City Students" determined five (5) key categories on what made the respondents utilize the platform: entertainment, learning, academics, engagement and interaction, and skills development. Entertainment was the most salient TikTok category; it has over 500 billion hashtag views on the platform. The data of this study show the majority of TikTok users spend their time watching under the category of entertainment because it offers exciting content ranging from comedy, dancing, pranks, and celebrities to gossip. Moreover, learning and academics were chosen as further categories by the respondents of this study. A multitude of knowledge or information is created on the platform each day as the respondents described it as an avenue for them to learn new information or skills. TikTok made a campaign with the hashtags #LearnOnTikTok and #DidYouKnow across the platform to celebrate the most surprising, exciting, and unexpected things the users have learned on the platform. The content they usually view in these categories are health source information, life hacks or advice, news and information; science and technology, cooking or baking content and tutorials, and skincare.

The study further identified the common skills learned or developed by the respondents through TikTok. These are artistic skills, academic skills, soft skills, and practical skills. The top artistic skill sets they have learned or developed are video editing, photography, cooking, videography, and dancing. Furthermore, the top skill sets they have learned or developed in academics are written and verbal communication, listening, studying, reading, and note-taking. Meanwhile, the soft skills are communication, cultural awareness, time management, teamwork, and responsibility. Lastly, the practical skills the respondents have learned or developed on the platform are practical life hacks, DIY tutorials, craft ideas, makeup, dance choreography, and tutorials on how an application works.

The findings of the research found that the rising popularity of TikTok amongst younger generations is one of the effective ways to reach and engage students in another mode of learning. The definition of learning in the study is not limited to acquiring knowledge in an academic context, but rather in a general sense where the respondents have integrated and relate different concepts they have learned or developed on the platform in an overall context. Hence, all of those skills that were learned or developed by the respondents, which are manifested in the fact that the users of TikTok learn and teach a variety of content, reflect the phenomenon of the Connectivism Learning Theory (Siemens and Downes, 2005).

Related studies have shown that social media unearths positive and negative sides. However, with the use of a healthy amount of screentime and appropriate methods of the platform, TikTok can be an effective learning tool not just for the students at Mindanao State University-Marawi City, but for other institutions as well. Thus, academic institutions and teachers should take advantage of the application to incorporate it into their teaching methodologies and approaches.



### News and Information Reliance: News Media or Religious Leaders?

The emergence of multiple platforms has expanded the choices available to audiences for accessing news and information. These platforms include print, broadcast, and online mediums, enabling electronic transmission to individuals and large audiences. While printed media and broadcast mediums like television and radio still exist, their use as sources of information is uncertain compared to the prevalent online transmission of information. Nowadays, people can easily find and search for anything they want to read online, with information at their fingertips.

However, not everyone has full access to mass media, particularly in circumstances like the Internally Displaced Persons affected by the Marawi Siege in 2017. Geographic constraints and limited access to information and communication technologies (ICTs) prevent convenient internet use, leading to a reliance on face-to-face communication for acquiring information.

Based on my 2023 undergraduate thesis conducted in an IDP shelter in Brgy Pagalamatan, Saguiaran municipality, the study revealed that religious leaders and barangay chairpersons were the most trusted sources of information among the people in the Pagalamatan Shelter. Media organizations, traditional leaders, municipal leaders, and provincial leaders were not as trusted. The limited access to digital devices and geographical isolation led residents to rely on indirect sources such as religious and barangay leaders for information.

In this digital era, where media convergence provides people with a plethora of choices for obtaining news and information, it is crucial to ensure the reliability of these sources as communication plays a significant role in building rapport, connections, and relationships. Choosing the right information provider is vitawl since not all news and information sources can be trusted. In this innovative and dynamic era, changes occur over time. The aforementioned study employed various research methods to explore the concept of trust and identify specific factors that writers, researchers, and publishers can implement.





# Unraveling New Horizons: A Faculty's Perspective on Lanao del Sur's Promising Tourism and Hospitality Potential

Imagine a land adorned with its cultural heritage and traditions, magnificent mountain ranges, and marvelous water bodies, including the tranquil Lake Lanao, the country's second deepest and largest lake. Imagine this land nestled among Mindanao's colorful mosaic. Imagine its untapped tourism and hospitality potential finally unraveling towards new horizons. As a faculty member dedicated to tourism and hospitality instruction, join me as we delve into this voyage of exploring uncharted possibilities in my homeland – the captivating Province of Lanao del Sur.

The Province of Lanao del Sur is brimming with potential sustainable tourism and hospitality developments, just waiting to be unveiled. It is also home to several natural, man-made, and cultural resources and is surrounded by 39 municipalities and its capital city –Marawi. Its people trace back their origin to the royalties of the Southern Mindanao Region, which denotes its richness in culture and heritage. These essential factors form the foundation for the province's sustainable tourism and hospitality development.

From the perspective of a tourism management faculty member, I have explored the key factors contributing to tourism and hospitality development in my homeland. These factors encompass the availability of accommodation services in some localities in the Province of Lanao del Sur, the initiatives shown by the local government towards the advancement of the accommodation sector in their areas of jurisdiction, and the availability of homestay services and makeshift accommodations as an alternative for accommodation services.

Moreover, the various municipalities and the capital city of the Province of Lanao del Sur also boast their well-paved access routes in most areas, availability of transportation services, and a strong emphasis on safety and security. It is also home to a multitude of possibilities for outdoor activities, Halal tourism, and unique cultural experiences. In addition, its amenities further contribute to the growth and development of its tourism and hospitality industry, particularly with the availability of parking areas, markets, shopping malls, restaurants, banking, ATM facilities, Remittance centers, e-money alternatives, medical facilities, and emergency services, the existence of security outposts, PWD programs, and assistance projects, and the availability of other recreational amenities and facilities in the land. Other factors that could help advance tourism and hospitality development in the Province of Lanao del Sur further include natural attractions, cultural and historical attractions, man-made attractions, local food, and cultural products, and the accessibility and affordability of these attractions.

However, although the Province of Lanao del Sur is proud of its abundant resources, its advancement in the tourism and hospitality industry has been long-drawn-out, which may be caused by several challenges hampering its growth. These challenges range from economic, socio-cultural, and environmental aspects, which the province must address, such as the lack of income revenue due to the need to diversify its tourism products and services, the lack of effort and strategies

in promoting existing but less-known attractions, the need for investment in development projects, the absence of job opportunities and livelihood potentials, and the lack of regulation and oversight on various business establishments.

Furthermore, socio-cultural hurdles also arise due to the history of cultural and civil conflicts which pose challenges in attracting tourist arrivals, the skepticism of some members of the community towards tourism and hospitality development due to concerns about its negative impact on their cultural identity and heritage, lack of engagement with host communities on the LGU's planning and monitoring processes for tourism and hospitality development, the lack of promotion and marketing strategies on local food and cultural products, and the loss of human capital and expertise brought by the lack of employment and livelihood opportunities. Other challenges contributing to the gradual development of its tourism and hospitality industry further include improper solid waste management practices, sewage management and flooding issues, and ecological damage from illegal logging activities.

Nonetheless, as I delved deeper into the factors and challenges of tourism and hospitality development in my homeland, its true and promising potential also began to unravel. These possibilities pave the way for new horizons that can transform and improve the status of the Province of Lanao del Sur in its aspiration towards sustainable tourism and hospitality development.

These promising potentials lie in the strengthened partnership between and among the Local Government Units with the provincial, regional, and national governments and other external agencies in implementing development projects in the tourism and hospitality industry. Other potentials also encompass the province's transportation infrastructures, formulation of a tourism development plan for the systematized implementation of the industry's growth and development projects, continuous and intensified Local Government support on sustainable tourism and hospitality development, mitigation measures on the negative economic, socio-cultural, and environmental impacts of the industry, promotion of technological advancement and information dissemination, increased promotional and advertisement strategies, and the continuing implementation of peace and order are all crucial steps toward realizing this vision.

Thus, with the uncharted possibilities of the Province of Lanao del Sur just waiting to be unraveled, it holds immense potential for sustainable tourism and hospitality development. The Province of Lanao del Sur, my homeland to whom I pay homage, can embark on a transformative journey that will benefit its people, the Meranaws, and its tourists, by making the most of its beautiful resources, addressing the challenges that hamper its advancement head-on, and fostering strategic collaborations. Together, I implore you. Let us unleash these uncharted possibilities as the land of Meranaws becomes a beacon of cultural and natural diversity in the country, inviting travelers from all walks of life, far and wide, from all over the world, to experience what we have to offer.

Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center (MCHC) and OIPP Director, Prof. Sorhaila L. Latip-Yusoph, PhD discussed the purpose of column writing and podcasting in delivering information.

During the event, participating IOs were also furnished with some tips about the process of doing podcasts and constructing column write-ups. Before the training ended, they were tasked to create their possible column and podcast titles, which were presented during the plenary session. The new MSU-Marawi website was also introduced by University Webmaster Ramil Samporna who assisted the participants in facilitating and uploading inputs to their respective web pages as part of the Web Population Training. It was also announced that this newly created university website will be the official one-stop-source of all MSU clients to know more about the University and its

constituents. Thus, it will serve as the primary portal of the MSU community to the world.

Afterwards, University IOs also underwent into trainings on Infographics and poster design, mobile journalism (MoJo), and Photo Journalism (Photojourn) in order to brush up their communication skills and unleash their creativity and innovation. These trainings were carried out at the MCHC wherein the relevance of the said topics in today's world were given emphasis.

Infographics and poster designs are the graphical representations of information and data to precisely explain it to the readers or viewers. These do not only include texts but also icons, graphs, charts, and diagrams. In addition, these are widely used by both professionals and students since they can easily and visually summarize and present complex information. MoJo is a form of media which provide convenience to the people especially journalists considering that it allows them to record, process, and circulate information through portable electronic devices like mobile phones. Photojourn is also a peculiar way of telling stories as it uses photos to deliver a message, express emotion, depict the situation, and influence decisions.

This digital age has indeed made media as the principal source and vehicle of mass communication as it supplies vast information in different forms through a wide range of channels. To conjure a collage of images in one's mind of an ordinary village boy who has extraordinary dreams of conquering the global stage, a "Jack of all trades" who sold native delicacies to support himself, a coach of fancy drills, a dance instructor, a certified "green thumb," international consultant and coordinator, and a knack for languages, then the person that comes to mind is **DR. HENELITO ARIAS SEVILLA, JR.** 

**Dr. Henelito "Hennyjun" Sevilla** graduated from the Mindanao State University-Marawi Main Campus (MSU) with the degree of Bachelor of Science in International Relations (B.S.I.R.). He pursued Master of Arts in International Relations with specialization in Foreign Policy (Thesis) from the Faculty of Law and Economics, Shahid Behesti University and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) in International Relations with specialization in Political Economy of Energy (Dissertation) from the Faculty of Law and Political Science at Tehran University, Tehran, Iran.

Currently the Dean of the Asian Center, University of the Philippines-Diliman (UP), **Dr. Henelito Sevilla, Jr.** also served as its full professor teaching several courses in Philippine Foreign Relations and West Asia Studies to graduate students since 2008.

As the Dean of Asian Center, he served in many university committees in various capacities. He is a council member of the Tri-College PhD Philippine Studies Program of the University of the Philippines-Diliman. He is responsible for the reopening of and coordinating with the West Asia Studies Track for the Asian Center and had advised a number of graduate students in their theses and dissertations for many years already. As a professor, he is recognized as one of the top ten "Philippine Scientist and University Social Science/International Relations Ranking 2023" by AD Scientific Index (Philippines Scientist and University in the Philippines Ranking 2023 – AD Scientific Index 2023).

Dr. Sevilla is also a board member to Journal of South Asian Studies and served as one of the editorial advisers to the Bangsamoro Parliament's Legal and Policy Research (BPLPR) where he is also an honorary fellow.

Furthermore, he is a member of several academic, cultural and public oriented organizations such as the International Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, University of the Philippines-Diliman Chapter, the Mindanao State University Rearguards, Inc., the Mindanao State University Phi Lambda Epsilon (PLE), Delta Phi Chapter, the MSU Darangen Cultural Troupe, and the Philippine Eagles.

Along with this list, Dr. Sevilla also served as an adviser and officer or several academic and cultural organizations, namely, the Philippine International Studies Organization (PHISO), The Balangay Artist Association (BAA), and the Agusan Artists Association (AAA). He founded and served as its current president of the Philippine-Middle East Studies Association (PMESA) and the Philippine-Iran Scientific and cultural Society (PICS). He was twice elected as president of the Filipino-Irano Community Association (FICA) in Tehran, serving the interests of the Filipino diaspora in Iran.

A passionate and dynamic person who understood the importance of cultural diversities, Dr. Sevilla advocated the promotion and preservation of the indigenous knowledge either through teaching, research and community outreach programs. In relation to his professional expertise, Dr. Sevilla has been regularly interviewed and consulted by government agencies, think-tanks, local and foreign news media outlets, etc. on issues related to Philippine interests such as OFWs concerns, Middle East development, and Asia-Pacific geopolitics among others.

As an educator, **Dr. Henelito A. Sevilla, Jr.** is an active and recognized researcher and author in the areas of Middle East studies, foreign policy, geopolitics, security, political economy, and Mindanao issues. His research production has given him the opportunity to be invited as speaker in national and international conferences such as at the United Nations, Turkey, China, Iran, United States, Brazil, Thailand, Vietnam, Malaysia, Indonesia, Myanmar, South Korea, Japan among others.

As a multi-awarded educator, he received several international publication awards confirmed either by the University of the Philippines or by international award bodies: He received twice

an International Publication Award given by the University of the Philippines; One of very few recipients of the 2018 Distinguished International Relations Scholar given by the Philippine International Studies Organization (PHISO); National Capital Region (NCR) Sole Nominee for Adult Category at the 2019 Search for Outstanding Volunteer Award given by the Department of Interior and Local Government (DILG) and the National Volunteer Service Coordinating Agency; Most Outstanding Professor and Advocate of Environmental and Cultural Preservation of the Year given at the 4th Asia-Pacific Luminare Awards in 2021.

Adding to his credentials, he has also been regularly awarded either a Centennial Professorial Chairs or Centennial Faculty Grants by the University of the Philippines for several years now. These awards are given to distinguished faculty members of the University of the Philippines for their exceptional scholarship achievements in teaching, research and publications, and extension services. In 2022 for example, he received a ONE UP Centennial Professorial Chair for Teaching and Research.

In the area of public service, Dr. Sevilla is a commissioned officer of the Armed Forces of the Philippines Reserved Command (AFPRESCOM). As an officer, he led and helped his group in carrying out its humanitarian and environmental mandates through several community drives, environmental protection and conservation initiatives, relief distribution, medical and dental missions, feeding activities for street children and in the orphanages as well as to elderly people in several home for the aged institutions. As the result of this humble and selfless act, he was given awards by the AFPRESCOM for his leadership in carrying out various humanitarian and community services rendered to many unfortunate Filipinos in the country.

Apart from English and Tagalog, **Dr. Henelito A. Sevilla** is fluent in Butuanon, Cebuano, Ilongo, Maranao and Persian (Farsi) languages.

A person whose dream is to promote the interests of his own origin, culture and heritage in the wider Philippine society and abroad, Dr. Hennyjun Sevilla always carried and exemplified in himself the essence of a true Butuanon and Agusanon Manobo. He was awarded one of the Most Outstanding Butuanons of 2023.

### MSU-CAO in Safeguarding and Preserving the Cultural Heritage in Mindanao

The MSU-Cultural Affairs Office (MSU-CAO) is the center of music, cultural and theater groups in the University that is duly supervised by Director Henri Marc H. Ele. Among the performing groups under the office are the University Band (UB) under the baton of Crizpulo T. Ruz, Darangan Cultural Dance Troupe (DCDT) through the new Artistic Director Nadzmie A. Alihasan, University Combo (UC) through the

leadership of Officer-in-Charge Joey B. Panganiban, Sining Kambayoka Ensemble (SKE) headed by Artistic Director Pepito P. Sumayan, and the Sining Pananadem (SP) headed by its new Artistic Director Mohammad-ali T. Hadji Usman. The groups are the bearers of the culture and arts in the University. It is noted that one of the 10-point agenda of MSU System President Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno is making the University a beacon of culture and arts development.

The culture and arts in Mindanao faced threats to their vitality, currency and even existence because of the encroachment of modernization and problems on peace and order, the concept of globalization that affects the elements of the cultural heritage. The MSU-CAO is mandated to help in safeguarding and preserving the heritages of the Indigenous and Bangsamoro Peoples culture and arts.

The office is the home of the five music, cultural and theater groups that promotes, preserve and safeguard the remaining precious heritage that our ancestors handed down to us. The concept of "pamana", "kabilin", "pusaka" or heritage are the important things that we have from our ancestors and we are obliged to protect it for our identity. The importance of the heritage is as important as life. Everybody is always looking and promoting their identity.

One of the Meranaw culture that we have possessed is the philosophy of "kambilangataw", the standard ways and etiquettes of the Meranaws taught us by our ancestors to maintain the peace and order in the Pat a Phangampong sa Ranaw or the four principalities of ranaw such as the Unayan, Masiu, Bayabao and Balo-i Pangampong. The knowledge of kambilangataw has been practiced by our Sultan, Datu, Baiyalabi and leaders in the community since time immemorial.

The kambilangataw is likely read and observed in the Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH) practices of the Meranaw and one of these is the Darangen epic stories, the UNESCO's recognized as world oral intangible cultural heritage for humanity in 2005 and soon in the list is the Lakub (the Meranaw bamboo tobacco container) recommended to be included in the tangible cultural heritage preservation.

The presence of ICH in the music, cultural and theater groups duly supervised by the office is the manifestation that the ICH or culture and arts shall be sustained for the next generations to come. The groups' performances are visible in both university in and off-campus events and invitations.

## Introducing the "Paninggalan Black Ceramics"

The production of ceramic made from local raw materials is challenging, primarily when the chemical and physical properties are not characterized through study. In addition, the interest in developing the product without the aid of modern technology (e.g., modern kiln, pulverizer, etc.) is also a significant hindrance to innovating such products. These challenges are constantly embedded in the MSU - Ceramics Development Center journey. Despite these predicament issues, Director. Acsara A. Gumal tasked the resident ceramic engineer to innovate products. This led to the fabrication of a new product called "Paninggalan Black Ceramics."

The Black Paninggalan Ceramics is one product that the MSU – CDC has never produced since the founding of the center in 1973. The beauty of the Black Paninggalan Ceramics is its unusual appearance of being natural wblack due to its carbon content, distinguished by its deep black hue and frequently glossy or matte texture, which is widely prized. In the SUC fair 2022 was held at Mall of Asia in partnership with Commission on Higher Education wherein the MSU – Marawi Participated and showcased the university's products, including the "Black Paninggalan Ceramics," which had been sold out on the very first day of the said event – because

of its uniqueness as compared to other ceramics product showcased by other universities during the said event. Some characteristics of black Paninggalan ceramics that contribute to its attractive feature are its unique color, a deep black color achieved through a reaction that occurs during firing, resulting in its unique texture. Frequently, the rough, tactile roughness of black pottery enhances its attractiveness. The nature of the clay and the firing process produces this texture, which can result in highly desired surface variances and imperfections. The Paninggalan black ceramics can be given a glossy finish, improving its aesthetic appeal, and naturally acts as a protective coating. In addition to its aesthetic design, the Okir design is engraved into it, which is the trademark design of the Meranaw (people of the lake), which makes the Paninggalan ceramics authentic made by the Meranaw, particularly in MSU – CDC staff.

### Dr. Abamo: Lake Lanao is still ecologically healthy

"Ecologically speaking, Lake Lanao is still healthy," declared by Dr. Fema M. Abamo, the Vice Chancellor for Research, Extension, and Development, during the National Research Council of the Philippines (NRCP) Regional Mindanao Policy Forum held last 27 April 2023 at the International Convention Center, MSU-Marawi Campus, in a form of a talk show. The event aimed to translate the results of Dr. Abamo's research in Lake Lanao into policy recommendations, a project funded by NRCP entitled, "Preliminary Inventory and Diversity Of Ciliated Protozoans in Lake Lanao: Its Spatial and Temporal Variations and Its Bioindication on Lake's Water Quality." The talk show, an episode of NRCP's "May Magandang Bukas Mula sa Pagtuklas" was hosted by the Executive Director of DOST-NRCP, Dr. Bernardo N. Sepeda, and was attended by representatives of various local government units of Lanao del Sur, BARMM Provincial Environment, Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO), and faculty members of the university.

Dr. Abamo's research team collected water samples from different locations, namely Marawi City, Ramain, Taraka, Balindong, and Binidayan. Two sampling substations were established in these areas: littoral zone (shallow section) and pelagic zone (deeper section) of Lake Lanao. Water samples were collected during mixing, non-mixing, dry, and wet seasons between 2016 to 2018. These water samples were examined to determine the abundance of ciliated protozoans, which are one-celled eukaryotes characterized by the presence of hair-like structures called cilia. Ciliates abundance was used as a bioindicator of organic pollution in Lake Lanao. The research intended to assess the trophic state of the lake based on planktonic ciliate abundance. Overall, the ciliate abundance was below 2.4 cells/mL in all the sampling periods and in all sampling areas, suggesting that the trophic state of Lake Lanao falls under ultraoligotrophic. This means that Lake Lanao is characterized by low accumulation of dissolved nutrient salts, supporting a sparse growth of algae, and having a high oxygen content owing to the low organic content. In other words, Lake Lanao is ecologically healthy.

"As any body of water, Lake Lanao is also confronted with environmental pressures, maybe due to the increasing number of human populations thriving around Lake Lanao and also climate change," Dr. Abamo declared in her talk. Not unknown to locals, Lake Lanao is extremely pivotal in shaping the identity of the Meranao people. The lake serves multiple purposes, including the source of livelihood, drinking water, domestic activities, and irrigation. However, the increasing number of settlements near the lake is threatening its overall state.

Dr. Glen Lorenzo, vice president for Research and Development, has also emphasized the importance of collaboration with DOST-NRCP for research and development. "Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno, the MSU system President, put premium on research and extension. In fact, his top two agenda talk about academic excellence and research excellence. To attain this goal, one of the strategies is to establish research centers which include Lake Lanao and Watershed Research Center." The importance of conducting research on Lake Lanao and its watershed has been given more emphasis when Dr. Lorenzo declared, "Lake Lanao is life to the people in Lanao and to the rest of the people in Mindanao. About 70% of the electric needs of Mindanao comes from the hydroelectric plants, which are being supplied by the water coming from Lake Lanao."

While Lake Lanao remains ecologically healthy, Dr. Abamo's important message was the challenge to maintain its healthy state and implement effective measures to protect the lake from various threats and to conserve its environs. The representatives of the municipal government units and other relevant stakeholders have expressed their commitment of support to protect the lake from human and non-human threats.

Forester Pili M. Papandayan, the PENRO-Lanao del Sur, recognized the importance of the study to the targets of the province to have

research on environment and natural resources and energy profiling and preservation of the endemic fish. Forester Asmarie M. Labao, PENREO-Lanao del Sur, said "the different stakeholders are here to continue our efforts to protect Lake Lanao and its surroundings." The municipal mayor of Wato-Balindong, Hon. Amer-Reggie L. Bagul, has also expressed his support for research, particularly about the native fish species in Lake Lanao to help improve the aquaculture industry in his municipality. Representing the education sector, Prof. Mariam A. Sunggod was happy with the results, and she added "We in the education sector, our responsibility here is how can we communicate that result to the younger generation...how can we educate our young learners to help in taking care Lake Lanao, to be stewards." The event ended by calling on stage some members of the research team of Dr. Abamo, to wit, Prof. Camar P. Ameril, Prof. Cyrollah R. Disoma, and Ms. Hamema D. Cosain.#

It brought teachers, educations experts, community members, youth influencers and the media to feature leading local innovations in peacebuilding and conflict transformation centered in schools and communities in Mindanao. The panel discussion on preventing violent extremism in the basic education was fruitful. There were five educational experts who had shared their insights on the connection between values education and critical thinking as well as the impact of student-teacher relationship in the promotion of peace and security within the community. They emphasized the importance of the creation of student friendly classroom environment where students are free to speak up their mind and feel secure because when students are comfortable to express themselves, it will develop their creative and critical thinking. Furthermore, during the panel discussion they were able to share their perceptions on what are the gaps on preventing violent extremism in education. The educational experts shared some of the strategies they utilized like identifying social issues where students could relate and learned from contemporary pressing social issues.

Secondly, there were presentation of 18 empowered youth who took the leap and courage to become a premiere – maker in Mindanao. The PPF 3 Town Hall served as the culmination of the six-month fellowship journey of active youth peacebuilders across Mindanao. With their advocacies focusing on Women empowerment, Digital Literacy, and Peace Education, these Peace Fellow gathered for the OURmindaNOW (OMN) Summit 2023 & Peace Promotion Fellowship (PPF) 3 Town Hall and highlighted the successes of their own peace projects and their ways forwards as part of the sustainability program of the said organization. Lastly, the networking session conducted to enable participants to connect with each other and form meaningful relationship through conversation. In their desperation, they tried everything like going to Kaporoan a Loway<sup>3</sup> to seek the help of renowned pamomolong<sup>4</sup>. As advised, they religiously performed kaphaygo sa ig<sup>5</sup>, kapamalong<sup>6</sup> and kapamotar<sup>7</sup>. However, so much time had fleeted, and all their efforts proved futile. Dayangdayang began to lose hope.



One night, while Dayangdayang was soundly asleep, she dreamt.

"Dayang... Dayang...," a strange calm voice could be heard calling her name.

"Dayangdayang, listen," the mysterious voice said in her dream.

"Eat the seda a bolawan8 that your husband will get this Divamaat9 from Payong a  $Bae^{10}$  of Ranao so that you will be blessed with a child," were the last words she heard.

The Payong a Bae was a part of the Ranao like a whirlpool that sucked and slurped anyone who wandered there. According to miyawna a manga taw<sup>11</sup> who witnessed, no one came back alive from that part of Ranao. Many had tried to get the *seda a bolawan* and paid dearly with their lives. Dayangdayang woke with a start and excitedly roused Sumang from his sleep. She narrated him what she dreamt of. Upon learning of the strange dream, Sumang led a prayer to Tohan<sup>12</sup>.


Eighteen years passed imperceptibly.




These words gushed forth from Lawan while she was staring at Ranao.

Records management and data protection are integral parts of administering an organization considering that good management entails quick, accurate, and reliable access to records, timely demolition of redundant or irrelevant information, and apt protection of imperative documents. These two serve as the backbone of a transparent and accountable administration or government. In addition, these are among the major requirements for an agency or unit to be certified by the International Organization for Standardization (ISO) particularly in ISO 9001:2015-a standard for general organizational quality management system (QMS) – that the Mindanao State University-Marawi is applying for.

In order to ensure that the University has an ISO records management standard, the designated Records Officers (ROs) and Data Protection Officers (DPOs) of each unit undergone into various capability building sessions. These activities were initiated and organized by the Records Management Office headed by Dr. Ibrahim H. Aliponto, PhD in partnership with the University Quality Assurance Office led by Atty. Jaynevev A. Recentes-Magolama.

The first activity was the Seminar-Workshop on 5S in the Workplace: Organizining for Greater Public Sector Productivity that took place on April 13, 2023 at the Conference Room of the Office of the President. The principles and importance of 5S Good Housekeeping as an instrument and method in paving the path of the organization's continuous improvement system particularly on keeping and protecting accounts were emphasized. According to Dr. Aliponto, the 5S was rooted from the Japanese words Seiri, Seiton, Seiso, Seiketsu and Shitsuke which are translated as Sort, Set in Order, Shine, Standardize, and Sustain. It was noted that 5S is also recognized all over the world as an effective technique in performing the daily operation of a unit since it centers on instilling and sustaining cleanliness and orderliness as well as securing the safety of the employees.

Atty. Recentes-Magolama presented the crafted MSU Quality Workplace Standards as part of incorporating 5S in ISO 9001:2015 particularly on Clause 7.14 (Environment for Operation of Processes). She also discussed the roadmap to 5S implementation wherein some approaches to its successful practice were cited. She concluded her discussion with the golden rule, "" to encourage the participants to always apply 5\$ in their day-to-day life especially in their workstations to maintain quality standards.

A Data Privacy Protection Training was then conducted on May 5, 2023 at the same area wherein University Data Protection Officer, Saadre D. Rago, MM, JD highlighted the significance and pillars of data privacy compliance as well as the consequences of its violations based on the Data Protection Act of 2012. Furthermore, Dr. Aliponto enlightened the participants on their obligations as keeper of various data and information including sensitive personal information of the clients.

"As records officers and data protection officers, you are accountable to your unit's acquisition, management, analysis, governance, and protection of data. Thus, you should be responsible with the data and information you are keeping and safeguarding at all cost," said by Dr. Aliponto.

A link was also created for all designated ROs and DPOs along with the provision of their institutional email addresses to maintain speedy and easy communication and dissemination of vital records. These series of capability building activities will still continue with the objective of formulating a quality modern system in the management of the University records to uphold its authenticity and efficiency. In fact, a 3-day training-seminar on records management principles and functions is scheduled to be held in the third week of June 2023.

# MSU-Maguindanao achieves recognition as the 2nd Best Performing University by AACCUP

Mindanao State University-Maguindanao achieved a noteworthy milestone by being recognized as the Top 2 Performing State University with the highest number of Level 1 Accredited Programs in 2022. The award was presented to the University by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP) during the 36th Annual National Conference on March 29, 2023 at the Century Park Hotel in Manila.

The conference, themed "Strengthening a Culture of Quality Assurance in Higher Education through Partnerships in Accreditation," provided a platform for State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) nationwide to engage in discussions and collaborative efforts to advance quality assurance processes and standards in higher education.

The recognition demonstrates MSU-Maguindanao's enhanced performance as well as its dedication to providing better and quality education given the diverse academic programs. Of the 15 Level 1 programs, five are from the College of Agriculture, four degree programs from the College of Education, two programs from the College of Public Affairs and Governance and the College of Arts and Sciences respectively, while one for each of the College of Forestry and Environmental Studies and the College of Fisheries. Specifically, the following degree programs successfully hurdled Level 1 AACCUP accreditation:

- Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Business Management
- Bachelor of Science in Agriculture major in Agronomy
- Bachelor of Science in Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering
- Bachelor of Science in Agriculture major in Extension Education
- Bachelor of Science in Agriculture major in Animal Science
- Bachelor of Science in Forestry major in General Forestry
- Bachelor of Science in Fisheries
- Bachelor of Elementary Education major in General Education
- Bachelor of Secondary Education major in English
- Bachelor of Secondary Education major in Mathematics
- Bachelor of Secondary Education major in Sciences
- Bachelor of Science in Social Work
- Bachelor of Public Administration
- Bachelor of Science in Information Technology
- Bachelor of Arts in Islamic Studies.

Notably, the University applied for Preliminary Survey Visit (PSV) on July 26-30, 2021 and was followed by the Level 1 Accreditation proper on September 26-30, 2022. The comprehensive evaluation determined that these programs have satisfied the standards of quality education, validating the university's commitment to delivering a well-rounded and impactful learning experience.

In her message, Chancellor Bai Hejira Nefertiti Macalandong-Limbona conveyed her gratitude and accolades to the faculty members and the deans of various colleges for their significant contributions and unwavering commitment to the university. ## OVERSIGHT ON SITE

In exigency of service and the University's commitment to pursue academic excellence in the operations of all its campuses, an Oversight Committee to review and evaluate the operations of the MSU-Main Extension Campuses is created through a Special Order No. 050 -OP, Series of 2023. The Committee is composed of Dr. Amerkhan G. Cabaro, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and at the same time the chairman of the oversight committee, co-chaired by the Vice President for Planning and Development, Engr. Rodrigo Baid, MSCE. Members are the deans of the various colleges offering the programs.

Undergraduate and graduate degrees are being offered as extension programs in **MSU-Marawi Campus Sindangan Extension** (BS Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering, BS Chemical Engineering, BS Civil Engineering, BS Electrical Engineering, BS Mechanical Engineering, BS Fisheries, BS Environmental Science, and BS Psychology); in **MSU-Maguindanao** (Doctor of Public Administration); and in **MSU-Marawi Campus Isulan Extension** (Master of Public Administration and Certificate in Governmental Management).

Primarily the committee is tasked to thoroughly review the status of every program offered in the Extension Campuses, effectively and efficiently monitor and evaluate the teaching performances of the faculty members in the main campus who are assigned to teach in the extension campus, assess the facilities, laboratory equipment, and other materials necessary for the operation of its program, make recommendation/s for the improvement of the operations of the Extension Campuses, and closely monitor if the agreements stipulated in the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the MSU-Main Campus and the concerned Local Government Units (LGUs) are conscientiously followed.

Through the efforts of the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the Oversight Committee has initially conducted ocular inspections, reviewed, and evaluated the implementation of the provisions stated in the existing MOA on extension programs between Mindanao State University – Marawi Campus and the Local Government Unit of Sindangan, Zamboanga del Norte, Local Government Unit of Isulan, Sultan Kudarat, and MSU-Maguindanao, Maguindanao del Norte.

Last February 26-28, 2023, the Oversight Committee conducted an ocular visit at MSU-MCSE. Using the MBHTE-Higher Education BARMM COPC template, the committee has observed some minimum standards required by the Policies, Standards, and Guidelines or PSG for each program that need to be strengthened through provisions of adequate number and compliant sizes of laboratories for general, specialized, and professional subjects, a physical library, and even additional faculty members with the desired qualifications. But these are gradually addressed by the local government unit of Sindangan, Zamboanga del Norte through making MSU-MCSE a part of their Annual Investment Plan with an indicated separate budget. And this gives the assurance that eventually MSU-MCSE can comply with the minimum standards. Thus, MSU-MCSE despite this challenge still has created an impact in the lives of the students, providing affordable yet quality education and thereby honing the community to be responsible and relevant.

On a similar objective, last March 18-20, 2023, the Oversight Committee visited the Graduate School of MSU-Maguindanao in Tamontaka, Datu Odin Sinsuat (DOS), Maguindanao del Norte and the Graduate School of MSU-Main Campus, Sultan Kudarat Extension. Through series of table discussions, the Committee together with the focal persons of the different extension programs, provisions in the existing Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) were refined aiming to address present concerns in data recording, financial reporting, records keeping, enrolment, and even setting the accreditation standards in inviting lecturers and faculty members to teach in the graduate program. With the site visits so far, the Oversight Committee looks forward to meeting other MSU-Marawi extension campuses to make sure that the standards set forth by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and the University are upheld.

Vice President for Planning and Development Engr. Rodrigo S. Baid envisions the council's output as one that could greatly help the Office of the President in the analysis of the

overall operation and direction of the MSU System given the scale of its operation as an 11-campus system with two extension campuses.

Guany had an extensive exploratory meeting as to how the envisioned system's operations manual be undertaken given the complexity of the task. Another round of meeting was held at MSU-Main Campus, last February 28, 2023 with VP Baid in attendance.

"Technically, what we intend to achieve here, is to be able to consolidate and codify a System-wide Operations Manual, consisting of policies and guidelines, systems and processes, together with the legal basis from which all these emanate from. I know, it would be a very long journey to undertake, but really we have to start somewhere, and as early as now", VP Baid replied when asked on this matter. "And to have one very functional and reliable system operations manual in the future, that will speak of ONE MSU that Pres. Mapupuno has initiated", he added.






### **President's List Honorees**

## 2023 MERANAO AUTOCROSS: THE BATTLE OF CHAMPIONS

No one would have imagined that Marawi could host such big sports events as autocross. Given Marawi's disposition, people would never think that it was possible since autocross is a motorsport activity that typically takes place in large parking lots or open paved areas where a course is laid out using traffic cones or pylons. But Marawi is a fantastic location for motorsport activities and events and has a lot more to offer.

Auto racing in the heart of Marawi with the launch of the Meranao Autocross: The Battle of Champions held last March 4–5, 2023, at the streets of Ground Zero. This will enable local autocross racers, particularly those from Marawi and Lanao del Sur, to qualify for the battle of champions on the second day of the autocross competition.

While this race takes us far down south, it appears to be thriving and bringing joy to the racers battling it out for supremacy. This is indeed going to be a racing series event at Ground Zero, and the venue itself is a great opportunity to set foot in the aftermath of the war that happened years ago. It is the biggest autocross event in the city, making this the most historic and successful sporting event of the year





## PPD completes Repair and Renovation of Bolawan Hall Building

Bolawan Hall Building was constructed in 1997 under the administration of former MSUS President Emily A. Marohombsar. The building was intended to accommodate students enrolled in the University. Currently, it is a dormitory for female students which has 55 rooms and which can accommodate around 232 persons. It will be opened in the first semester, Academic Year 2023-2024.

The project "Repair and Renovation of Bolawan Hall Building" under the administration of Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno was estimated to cost PhP 12,894,835.56. On February 8, 2023, a ribbon-cutting and turn-over ceremony of the said project was held. It was attended by the MSUS President and some University Officials and Unit Heads who were welcomed by Engr. Cayamora A. Macarambon, Assistant University Engineer, in her Welcome Address. Director Dimaporo gave her turn-over speech which was followed by a message from MSUS President Mapupuno. Thereafter, Nagaranao Sangcopan, Director of Housing Management Division, conveyed his acceptance and short message. Director Dimaporo in her Closing Remarks thanked the MSUS President, the University Officials and Unit Heads and other participants for fully supporting the implementation of the project and for gracing the ceremony.


