President's Message on the December 3 Incident

To the MSU Administration, faculty, staff, students, alumni, and members of the general public who may be viewing this today, Assalamu Alaikum, my greetings of peace and may God's protection be upon us all in these difficult times.

Yesterday morning, a horrific act of terror happened within the campus, which caused the loss of some lives and injuries to many others. The incident unleashed so much anger, hurt, frustration, pain and it has cast a pallor of gloom and apprehension on the part of the Christian and Catholic members of the MSU Main Campus community. We, the MSU Administration and Community vehemently condemn such an atrocious act of terror, which clearly was intended to sow fear and division to a community whose constituents, who belong to various faiths have been co-existing peacefully and exercising their right to freedom of religion inside the campus for more than six decades now.

To the families of those we have lost in the tragedy, the MSU family and I offer our deepest, sincerest condolences, and along with you, we pray that your departed loved ones rest in peace and be given the justice they so deserve. We join you in your pain, and to be honest, a part of us, of every MSUan died along with them.

To the injured, we offer you support and prayers for your fast recovery and healing; to their families, we pray that you will be blessed with the strength to assist your loved ones in their time of great need.

But in the midst of the deluge of negative emotions going around at the moment, we must remember that terrorism recognizes no religion nor socio-economic background. What happened is not only an attack on our Christian brothers and sisters, it is an attack on all who work, study, and live in this campus. It is a massive blow to all of us who love peace and who strive to live by its principles. Let us also be reminded that we as MSUans have a special role to play in being beacons of peace, and that this crime, heinous as it is, will not stop us from working towards a more peaceful community and a better world.

The MSU administration has been on the alert, and working since yesterday round the clock, with the AFP, the PNP, and other relevant agencies to investigate the incident and to formulate and put into place measures that will greatly aid in preventing another tragedy like this from happening, as well as to apprehend and bring to justice the perpetrators of this evil act. After many consultations and assessments conducted in the campus immediately after the attack, the AFP and the PNP have declared that the campus can now return to normalcy. Rest assured that we are working tirelessly for the security of our community. The university has been provided with one company from the PNP Regional Battalion to augment the existing PKF personnel. In addition, we will have an additional company of uniformed personnel from the AFP. The campus is on full alert, with heightened police visibility and intensified checkpoints. We have also created a special investigation task force for the apprehension of the suspects/ persons of interest and the filing of criminal charges. We have also identified 11 standby areas in the 7 barangays of MSU. Last but not the least, we will be conducting a series of psychosocial interventions such as stress debriefing for the constituents of the university.

On the academic side, we are convening and consulting with the relevant offices and college deans to come up with doable solutions to the issues left behind by the aftermath of the incident. As soon as we come to a consensus on what is to be done for the remainder of this semester, we will disseminate the details. Students and faculty, rest assured that regardless of where you come from, your safety and well-being are always priority for us.

I would also like to take the opportunity to thank everyone in the MSU community and beyond, who, in one way or the other, extended their kindness towards the affected and their families, towards the students who were in need of comfort and assistance. I cannot name all of you, but let me express to you my sincerest thanks for all you have done.

That said, in spite of our pain, in spite of the anguish and the fear, MSU must move on, and rise from what had befallen her. However, to do this, we must perform our part and help our Dakilang Pamantasan to sail on from this chapter and continue on her journey in bringing hope and peace to our land. Hence, I strongly exhort the MSU Main community to stand up and aid MSU to move on from what had happened. We must not let our grief debilitate us. Let us be vigilant, and cooperate with the authorities. Let us be prudent in dealing with and expressing our sentiments regarding this tragedy. Let us use social media wisely and make it a channel of unity, not of divisiveness, at this critical time.

Hindi ka mahirap mahalin, MSU. Sa loob ng mahigit anim na dekada, maraming kang biniyayaan ng liwanag, pag-asa, at naging dahilan ka kung bakit nakamit ng marami ang kanilang mga matatayog na pangarap. Because of this, we should love you all the more. Let us all stand for peace and unity. Let us all stand for MSU!





Reflections on Rawaten: A Rewarding Odyssey of Indigenous Cultures

As the main organizer of the recent Rawaten Cultural Extravaganza in Manila, I continue to bask in the glow of its success. Tasked by President Basari Mapupuno to put his vision into a reality was an honor despite all the possible challenges ahead.

Rawaten was an odyssey months in the making by the Mindanao State University System, overcoming many challenges along the way. The difficulty of finalizing the venue, to coordinating from a distance with production team and performers, collaborating with probable sponsors, to name a few, was an understatement. Seeing it come to fruition so spectacularly has filled me with immense pride and validation.

I vividly remember the uncertainty during the planning process, from conceptualizing the flow to coordinating logistics headed by a strong-willed colleague in the Communication and Media Studies Department, Tom Russ who is in UP-Diliman for his graduate studies. We persevered through funding issues, simultaneous university activities, communication issues with partners and venues, and last-minute performance changes. But challenges culminated into a profoundly rewarding experience as we celebrated the Bangsamoro and Mindanao's cultures against the backdrop of water's significance.

The spectacular two-show event provided platforms for over 200 indigenous performers to exhibit their communities' living heritage. From graceful lake-inspired dances to rousing river ensemble pieces, Rawaten spotlighted water's integral yet often unrecognized role. It served as microcosm for how we should view culture itself - not as immutable but rather an expression evolving symbiotically with people and nature.

Being the person who knew the ins and outs of the show and behind it, I cannot help but be thankful for direct funds given by the Mapupuno administration and the friends and organizations who have helped made Rawaten in Manila a success. The sleepless nights of the Manila Information Office staff before, during and after the show cannot be deemphasized. The use of the Manila Metropolitan Theater was the co-sponsorship made by the National Commission for Culture and the Arts. I am thankful to their Executive Director, Oscar Casaysay for this.

Further, the Rawaten team, myself and the committee members who went with me in Manila are indeed lucky to have partners, relatives and friends who are ready to assist. They are the silent waters nourishing me with inspiration.

Furthermore, the assistance given by Bangsamoro Autonomous Region Parliament Members (MP Marjanie, MP Diamila and MP Ras), the Government of Lanao (PLGU and Cong. Zia) have made our days in Manila easy. Also, from big-hearted individuals and organizations like the Federation of Women Royalty of Lanao, Binolawan, MSU Alumni Association in Luzon & Manila, and others who do not want their names mentioned, we are grateful. Topping this up with the support of the University of the Philippines-Office of the President and Asian Center, the Bangsamoro Commission for the Preservation of Cultural Heritage, LDLA Marketing, OB Montessori, and all the friends and relatives, we have knitted the tapestry of culture so well because of them.

As an organizer, the highlight was seeing the audiences awed by the spectacular jaw-dropping exhibitions made by each performing troupe. The loud laughters and shouts in every successful stunt made elated my own heart and made me burst into tears. Indeed, having Tom as the director, along with his production team, was a good choice. Entrusting him with the Rawaten's success was a risk I cannot deny but be proud.

While rewarding, organizing such a complex production was never easy. As a social scientist rather than performing artist, I frequently felt out of my depth, wondering if I had taken on too mammoth a task. But seeing the Extravaganza unfold so seamlessly washed away those doubts. The enormous efforts by everyone involved paid off.

Rawaten taught me that challenges before and after the event are integral to actualizing meaningful events. Its impact on performers and audiences alike showed that large undertakings pushing us beyond our comfort zone can deeply enrich a soul. I feel honored to have orchestrated this platform for One MSU and the whole of Mindanao's communities to proudly own and share their narratives though the colorful and vibrant exhibitions.

Experiencing Legal Education: A Dream Come True for Tawi-Tawians

The Story

MSU-TCTO OIPP

It seems as if the distant dream of establishing legal education remains unattainable. The remote locations, the feasibility of gathering students, the roster of faculty, and whatnot placed a sheer barrier between grand visions and the dim reality. But have the tides changed with time!

What is fear and uncertainty when Tawi-Tawians continue to dream for a better future? Nothing is impossible for these people. And not even distance can impede their fervor for legal education. Thus, like the Birth of Venus emerging from the sea, the MSU College of Law-Tawi-Tawi Extension was brought forth.

At the end of the second day of the MSU System Academic Summit in MSU-IIT, Iligan City, University President Atty. Basari Mapupuno signed a Memorandum of Agreement with MSU Tawi-Tawi

College of Technology and Oceanography, MSU - Maguindanao, and MSU Sulu. This agreement aimed to establish Extension Units of the MSU College of Law in these campuses following the Presidential Advisory Committee Meeting in November 2022.

The MSU College of Law-Tawi-Tawi Campus, the latest addition to the MSU College of Law's Extension Units, was officially established and endorsed by University President Atty. Basari Dimakuta Mapupuno. This significant decision was publicized at the Henry V. Kong Gymnasium during the 51st Commencement Exercises of the MSU Tawi-Tawi College of Technology and Oceanography on August 2, 2023.

President Mapupuno revealed the green light to introduce the Juris Doctor program, following a unanimous endorsement from the MSU College of Law Technical Working Group, co-headed by Prof. Dr. Alma E. Berowa (Vice President for Academic Affairs) and Prof. Atty. Norhabib Bin Suod S. Barodi (Dean of the College of Law). The initiative to bring the Juris Doctor program to Tawi-Tawi was spearheaded by MSU-TCTO's fifth regular Chancellor, Prof. Dr. Mary Joyce Z. Guinto-Sali, the first and only woman to hold this position.

Chancellor Guinto-Sali expressed gratitude and praised President Mapupuno's outstanding leadership for granting approval to introduce the Juris Doctor degree at MSU Tawi-Tawi.

"He saw the necessity and importance of offering a program that would provide an opportunity for Tawi-Tawians to become members of the legal profession. His tenacity, resolve, and sincerity in helping his fellow Bangsamoro fulfill their dreams through MSU education is simply remarkable."

The dream of both MSU TCTO and the Tawi-Tawian community has finally come true. The establishment of the MSU Law Extension in Tawi-Tawi, with MSU-TCTO as the host campus, marks a crucial achievement for both the academic community and the local residents. This initiative not only grants access to high-quality legal education but also enables the people of Tawi-Tawi to pursue their ambitions without the need to move or settle elsewhere. Now, Tawi-Tawians have the opportunity to gain legal knowledge, skills, and expertise right in their own community.

Indeed, MSU Tawi-Tawi strives to create more opportunities and transform the lives of every Tawi-Tawian. Hence, the dream of producing a new batch of competent Bangsamoro lawyers who will dedicate their practice to protect the inhabitants and ensure the legal services transpire social, financial, and geographic boundaries. Five years from now, we hope to celebrate the first batch of MSUan Tawi-Tawian lawyers. In Shaa Allah!

VP GLEN LOREN recognized for Geotech

With his feet planted like the deep foundations he designs, Dr. Glen Lorenzo has risen to become a pillar of strength in the field of geotechnical engineering. This is why he is the current Vice President for Research and Extension of the Mindanao State University system.

Dr. Glen, as everyone fondly addresses him, a professor of civil engineering at Mindanao State University in Marawi, has built an impressive reputation in the field of geotechnical engineering through his research, teaching, and professional consulting work.

Through his pioneering research, he has mixed knowledge like cement, binding together particles of understanding to solidify innovative techniques for improving weak soils. His work has paved the way for building upon once unstable grounds.

Like the geosynthetics he studies, Dr. Lorenzo weaves together threads of wisdom gleaned from academic pursuits and professional projects. He integrates theory with practice to reinforce real-world applications.

Over the course of his career, Dr. Glen has published over 21 papers in leading engineering journals, and 26 conference papers and a book chapter, accruing over 1200 citations for his scholarly contributions. He has become a trusted voice on geotechnical applications such as soil improvement methods, slope stability, foundation engineering, and the use of geosynthetics.

Like an anchor against slipping slopes, Dr. Glen probes his expertise as he holds a Doctor of Engineering degree in Geotechnical and Geoenvironmental Engineering from the prestigious Asian Institute of Technology in Bangkok, Thailand. His doctoral dissertation focused on deep soil mixing techniques, which earned him international recognition.

As Dr. Glen puts it,

Fishponds to Mangroves: Upcycling that answers climate change

Are all things abandoned useless? In the quiet corners of neglect, a hidden world of potential awaits. Abandoned spaces and forgotten items are not relics of the past but canvases for reinvention. However, this is not your simple upcycling story. It is the transformation of what was abandoned into a vibrant ecosystem that could solve the dire effects of climate change.

In a world grappling with anthropogenic carbon dioxide (CO2) emission issues, solutions for its mitigation come in various forms. However, through studying the potentiality of rehabilitated mangrove forests, researchers Habagat G. Mariano, Ruben F. Amparado Jr., Maricar Aguilos, Frandel Louis S. Dagoc, and Bryan Sumalinab of the College of Forestry and Environmental Studies (CFES) at Mindanao State University, realized a solution of their own.

Knowledge of the carbon sequestration of mangroves still has untapped corners and demands further discovery. Thus, by conducting a comparative analysis between a naturally grown mangrove forest and a reforested abandoned fishpond, a new corner of discovery has been unlocked. The numbers were astonishing. Realizing that these neglected aquaculture ponds, once rehabilitated, were enough to pass as a naturally grown forest, the study not only paints a clearer understanding of these carbon reservoirs but also suggests that through this transformation, the declining number of mangrove ecosystems can also be mitigated.

With dedication and monitoring, the team successfully reversed the negative impact on a heavily exploited fishpond in Zamboanga del Sur ravaged by a tsunami in the late 1970s. The aquaculture pond is now a lustrous mangrove forest with a density of 271 trees per hectare, even more significant than the natural mangrove forest's 211 trees per hectare.

The study also demonstrates Carbon Sequestration at its best, with the total aboveground biomass and carbon content almost uncanny between the reforestation site and the natural mangrove forest. Additionally, the researchers' scope of understanding the zonation patterns of these sites has led them to realize that abandoned fishponds hold resiliency with their unwavering aboveground and soil carbon estimates.

Despite the challenges of the researchers in terms of data gathering, the maintained communication between them, along with their collaboration with experts from local and international universities, was able to surpass any struggles. With their efforts, two articles were published out of the research study.

"There was an instance where I thought that I'd get sick after getting stung by bees I accidentally disturbed but because of the drive to finish the sampling on time, I had to keep going," Mr. Mariano shared on his experience.

This rollercoaster ride of a master's thesis went from initiating a solution, staying at sampling sites, living in local areas, getting stung by accidentally disturbed bees, and keeping the drive to move forward, to discovering a sustainable answer to carbon footprint reduction.

The researchers' efforts have provided what was once abandoned as a breath of life, highlighting the pivotal role of mangrove forests in addressing ecological losses due to anthropogenic carbon emissions globally. The findings of this research study are not just a piece of paper but a hope and inspiration for a greener, more carbon-balanced future.

Unlock the Potential of Sustainable Giant Freshwater Prawn Cultivation through Biofloc Technology!"

Aquaculture is one of the fastest growing food sectors in the world. The Biofloc Technology or BFT is a renowned technique in aquaculture, and the country that has mastered this technique is Thailand. BFT is a new revolution technique that helps to control pollution, water quality, and is a beneficial approach to sustain our ecosystem due to climate change. Thus, gives a good business sight.

In the Philippines, BFT is being practiced but, only limited scientists are practicing this technology. Here in the Philippines, only University of the Philippines Visayas (UP Visayas) has used this technology in the culture of Tilapia. And for the first time, The College of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences (CFAS) from Mindanao State University – Main Campus, used and applied BFT in the culture of Macrobrachium rosenbergii or Giant Freshwater Prawn.

The Philippines considered Macrobrachium rosenbergii as one of the commodities that is of commercial value. Different types of Shrimps are often cultured in Marine water environment, but no specific species such as freshwater shrimps that are being cultured using BFT. Thus, the study was conducted. The chairman of the Extension and Production of the College of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences (CFAS), Alejandro M. Gonzaga said, "No other persons or scientists in the entire world that has used BFT in the culture of Macrobrachium rosenbergii" The study was also recognized by the scientist, Yoram Avnimelech a pioneering scientist in the field of aquaculture, and has made significant contribution to the advancement of BFT. "In fact, when he was able to read our paper, he recommended our paper to be read by other scientists also" –Shared Alejandro.

Macrobrachium rosenbergii is a high value aquaculture species that is widely cultured in tropical and subtropical regions. However, intensive prawn farming can lead to water problems, such as high ammonia and nitrate levels. BFT has the potential to mitigate these problems and improve the overall sustainability of prawn culture.

"Biofloc Technology Application in Nursery Culture of Giant Freshwater Prawn, Macrobrachium rosenbergii" written by Ma-ann M. Camarin, Jhumar O. Jamis, and Alejandro M. Gonzaga - One of the recently concluded externally funded research of the College of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences (CFAS), MSU – Main Campus, funded by the Ministry of Science and Technology of the BARMM. The research focused on a 30-day feeding trial that was conducted to assess the impact of biofloc technology on the growth performance, water quality, and bacterial load of giant freshwater prawn (Macrobrachium rosenbergii) post-larvae (PL). The study involved evaluating different stocking densities under biofloc conditions.

The study was conducted to evaluate the effects of Biofloc Technology (BFT) on the growth performance of giant freshwater prawn (M. rosenbergii) post-larvae (PL). PLs were randomly stocked in 55-liter plastic aquaria filled with 50 liters of filtered freshwater at stocking densities of 2, 4, and 6 PL per liter. The BFT treatment group received no water exchange throughout the 30-day experimental period, while the non-BFT (NBFT) treatment group received biweekly water exchange.



Water quality monitoring-ammonia

The results demonstrated that the BFT treatment groups exhibited significantly superior growth performance compared to the NBFT treatment groups. This was evident in the significantly higher Mean Weight Gain (MWG), Net Prawn yield (NPY), Specific Growth Rate (SGR), Protein Efficiency Ratio (PER), and Average Daily Weight Gain (ADG) observed in the BFT treatment groups. Additionally, the Feed Conversion Ratio (FCR) of the BFT treatment groups was significantly lower than that of the NBFT treatment groups. These findings suggest that the implementation of BFT in prawn nursery culture can substantially enhance growth performance while mitigating water quality concerns without the need for regular water exchange. This holds significant potential for reducing labor and operational costs associated with water exchange in prawn aquaculture.

In conclusion, the study provides compelling evidence that BFT is a promising and sustainable technology for optimizing the growth performance of giant freshwater prawn post-larvae in nursery culture systems.

The BFT group exhibited the significantly best growth performance and efficiency while the control group exhibited the poorest. These findings suggest that prawn farmers can certainly benefit from the BFT by cutting short the feed expenses as the major cost in aquaculture production.

"It had a very promising result. Grabe ang increase in terms of weight ng mga cultured organisms natin" – said Jhumar. The result of this study suggests that BFT is a promising technology for the sustainable culture of giant freshwater prawn. BFT system can improve growth performance, water quality, and bacterial load of prawn PL, even at high stocking densities.

A. Publications with Incentives



B. Publications by College



Notably, one of the Gamaba (Gawad sa Manlilikha ng Bayan) awardees in 2016 hailed from Sarangani Province, recognized for her exemplary talent in mat weaving.


MSU-lligan Institute of Technology (MSU-IIT)'s performance infused the event with a *Kaamulan* Festival vibe, inspired by the legend of *Tabunaway* and *Mamalu*, two brothers separated by religion (one converted to Islam and the other remained as Lumad) but still vowed to honor their kinship and lived in harmony. The festival is also said to be a celebration of the seven tribes that comprise Bukidnon. These include Higaonon, Talaandig, Manobo, Bukidnon, Matigsalug, Tigwahanon, and Umayamnon. MSU-IIT's performance not only stunned the audience but also conveyed a meaningful message of fraternal coexistence.

Living up to its reputation as the university for the community, MSU-Naawan portrayed the traditions of the tri-people in Northern Mindanao, such as the Christians, the Meranaws, and the Higaonons. It also expressed the university's roles in realizing the hopes and dreams of the community through a tribute song played with an upbeat melody of guitars.

MSU-Buug's performance drew inspiration from the rituals and arts of the Subanen people, who primarily reside in the northern, southern, and western parts of Zamboanga Peninsula. What made their performance poignant was the fact that the performers wore Subanen traditional clothes personally made by the differently-abled indigenous people in Lapuyan, Zamboanga del Sur.

MSU-Tawi-Tawi College of Technology and Oceanography (MSU-TCTO) was represented by the Tambuli Cultural Dance Troupe,

who captured the audience with a breathtaking performance that depicted the culture of the natives of Tawi-Tawi province: the Samal, the Badjao, the Tausug, and the Jama Mapen, also known as sea dwellers. One of the dances performed was the *Pangalay*, a dance form characterized by slow and elegant hand movements that mimic the movement of ocean waves, enhanced by long, metal fingernails called *Janggay* worn by the dancers.

Hailing from a place that is also predominantly occupied by Tausug, MSU-Sulu showcased one of the sumptuous rituals they perform after a wedding ceremony, a sacred practice that reflects the deep-rooted unique customs and values of the Tausug community, to entertain the newlywed couple. Just like MSU-TCTO, MSU-Sulu also performed *Pangalay* but in a different version, as they resembled birds in flight. Dancers gracefully soared through the air as they performed *Pangalay* while standing on two bamboo poles carried by two men. Guests also tucked money between the fingers of the dancers as part of the tradition. MSU-Sulu's dance performance demonstrated that Tausug are not just valorous in wars but also in love, faith, and family.

MSU-Maigo School of Arts and Trades (MSU-MSAT), through the Indayog Cultural Dance Troupe, added a unique flavor to the event with a contemporary interpretative dance of *Kapayapaan sa Dakilang Pamantasan*, an original composition played by the campus' Inno Band. 



Omar-Macmod and the Cultural Affairs Coordinator, Bongbong U. Busran. The training equipped them with technical know-how in halal industry. It was organized by the UPM of Malaysia and was held at The Everly Hotel, Putarajaya, Malaysia on September 4 – 15, 2023. Additionally, Mr. Busran has been extended an invitation to join the culminating forum on November 14-17, 2023 at SEARCA Headquarters, College, Los Banos, Laguna.

It is worth noting that prior to this, MSU-LNAC has had a valuable track record in international training. Dr. Indihra B. Dimaporo-Tawantawan, the campus superintendent, was a SEARCA grantee for international trainings on Halal at Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia last April 2018 and a grantee for the International Convention on Farm Tourism at Tagaytay City of the same year.

These valuable trainings are truly significant in empowering the MSU LNAC faculty members to conceptualize innovative solutions and mobilize the rich geographical resources of the campus to address agricultural issues and bolster the halal industry in the local region.

MSU-Marawi Marks a Milestone in Quality Assurance through AACCUP Accreditation

The Mindanao State University (MSU)-Main Campus has taken a significant step in advancing quality assurance by hosting the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP), Inc. Preliminary and First Survey Visit on October 23-27, 2023 via digital platforms. An impressive count of 37 academic programs were submitted for accreditation, showcasing the university's dedication to upholding the highest educational standards and streamlining quality assurance in the academic community.

Kicking off the weeklong accreditation was a hybrid Opening Program held on October 23, 2023. Over a hundred participants joined the program, both virtually via Zoom and physically at the MSU International Convention Center. Dr. Alma E. Berowa, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and Chair of the Campus Quality Assurance Board (CQAB), emphasized the crucial role of accreditation in her opening remarks. She asserted, "It is only by submitting our programs for accreditation that we can truly gauge how close we are to achieving our institutional goals and aspirations."

Dr. Berowa proudly recounted the significant strides MSU has made in this endeavor, stating, "We are now on Season 2 of program accreditation. During the first phase, we successfully submitted 41 academic programs for Preliminary Survey Visit (PSV) in 2020, which were also submitted for Level 1 Accreditation. This achievement led to MSU being awarded as the Best State University and College (SUC) in 2021 for having the most number of Level 1 accredited programs by AACCUP." She continued, "With 35 academic programs now at the initial stage of accreditation, the road to quality assurance of MSU-Marawi

is already paved. The CQAB is gearing the campus full speed ahead for Level II accreditation by mid-2024."

Dr. Berowa concluded with a call to action, encouraging continuous improvement: "We should aim for a high level of excellence, stay there and never go down. Strive to make the good, better and better, best."

Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno, MSU System President, followed with an inspirational message highlighting MSU's achievements and aspirations. "As your president, I am deeply committed to seeing the majority of our academic programs reach Level 4 Accreditation before the end of my administration," he declared.

The university president went on to emphasize the relevance of program accreditation. "Our determination to attain higher levels of accreditation remains resolute. This endeavor harmonizes with my 10-point agenda, particularly on Agenda 1 which encompasses a continuous pursuit of academic excellence and quality assurance thru accreditation and establishment of centers of excellence and centers of development in the university," he pronounced.

Furthermore, Atty. Mapupuno shared the importance of these efforts, saying "The journey before us is not just a path. It is a living testament to our commitment to academic excellence and quality assurance. As we forge ahead, let us remember that the standards we set today will shape the destiny of our academic programs and the future of our students."

Immediately after the opening program, the AACCUP accreditors met with the program accreditation task force via Zoom and browsing of documents thru the accreditation website commenced. Validation of documents continued until Day 4 of the weeklong accreditation.

Finally, the closing program was conducted on October 27 at the MSU International Convention Center and via Zoom. It was a resounding success, marked by a synthesis of positive outcomes. The evaluators from AACCUP provided a comprehensive review, highlighting the university's strengths and areas for improvement.

The Deans of participating colleges took the stage with a forward-looking commitment, reinforcing their college's dedication to uphold the standards and to strive for even higher levels of accreditation.

Dr. Amerkhan G. Cabaro, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, delivered the closing remarks that resonated with optimism and intent. He underscored the importance of the accreditation process in enhancing the quality of education offered by MSU. He also expressed his gratitude to the MSU academic community and AACCUP accreditors for the overwhelming success of the accreditation.


