There were only a few restaurants and food places in and around the campus. We used to dine at just one spot in the commercial center—almost every time. Pizzas and grilled chicken. Ah, I'll never forget the 5-peso empanada, bloated with fillings.

It was a serene feeling when at MSU. It felt like a vacation every time. (Funny how my friends and I would gather at the exact spot in MSU during those times, even though we lived in different locations downtown, without the mobile phone technology we have nowadays.) The cool breeze was just ecstatic as it touched your face. There were no audible distractions, nor any visual obstructions. I guess progress has its price.

However, as changes continue in our society and surroundings, don't let it change how MSU made your day, your week, your months, and your years when you were there. The only constant in this world is "change," but make your changes the best version of everything. You might see changes in MSU now, but sit in a place where you sat before, and it will bring you back the same warm or cool feeling you had the very first day MSU welcomed you—with arms (I mean, trees) wide open.

Further, the conference highlighted a discussion on how Islamic banking could be used to provide financial services to people who were often excluded from traditional banking systems. This could empower communities and promote social cohesion. Another important topic was how Islamic finance could contribute to economic

stability, reduce inequality, and foster peaceful coexistence. This could help address the root causes of conflict and support peacebuilding efforts. Finally, the challenges and opportunities facing Islamic finance in a rapidly changing world were also discussed. This included the integration of new technologies like Fintech and the need for strong regulatory frameworks. Throughout the two-day conference, sharing of new researches, innovative ideas, and practical strategies for using Islamic finance to create a more sustainable and peaceful future were given emphasis in the parallel presentations and plenary sessions.

"Islamic Banking is not only for Muslims but for all;" says Atty. Arifa Ala, the Assistant Governor of Banko Sentral ng Pilipinas. Other ASEAN countries such as Malaysia and Indonesia reports that the methods of their Islamic Banks have been favored that they also have non-Muslim clients. Indeed, Islamic Finance is a financial system that is different from the conventional banks because it follows the Shari'ah Law. Islamic Banks, prohibits Riba (interest), Gharar (uncertainty), Maysir (gambling) and Haram. Islamic Finance is also referred to as Ethical Finance for its strong transparency, and lack of interest rates for

Their Sining Kambayoka Ensemble added a theatrical dimension with Halik sa Kampilan, a play exploring Meranaw history and traditions.



The cultural tapestry continued to unfold with MSU-Buua's Sinina Ghendawan Ensemble's presentation of the rich traditions of the Subanen people of the Zamboanga Peninsula. MSU-Sulu's Linggisan Cultural Troupe captivated the audience with their elegant Pangalay, a Tausug dance characterized by intricate hand and arm movements often enhanced by janggay (metal claws). MSU-Institute of Technology (MSU-IIT)'s Resident Performing Groups and Athletes presented the dazzling spectacle, "Silahis Gloria."

The Indayog Cultural Dance Troupe of MSU-Marawi State Agricultural College (MSU-MSAT) delighted with their performance of Sayaw sa Bangko, a lively Filipino folk dance featuring performers balancing on a bench. MSU-Maguindanao's Gandingan Cultural Dance Troupe created a romantic atmosphere with their portrayal of a traditional Maguindanao wedding. The Philippine Librarians Association, Inc.-BARMM Librarians Council (PLAI-BARMMLC), in collaboration with the University Library and the Department of Library and Information Science, hosted a summit on September 25-26, 2024. Held at the College of Hospitality and Tourism Management Pavilion, the event's theme, "The Library as a Digital Space for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion," drew attention to the evolving role of libraries in our increasingly digital and inclusive world.

The summit commenced with a warm welcome from Dean, Engr. Karla M. Madrid-Khalid, representing the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Dr. Amerkhan G. Cabaro, Following the welcome address, an inspiring message from Atty. Rashid V. Pandi, Director of the Presidential Management Staff, conveyed President Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno's commitment to the summit's mission. Dr. Alma E. Berowa, Vice President for Academic Affairs, shared her keynote address virtually, emphasizing libraries' essential role in supporting diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in the academic landscape.

The first day was packed with insightful sessions, each exploring into critical aspects of DEI and libraries in the digital age. The opening session, led by Dr. Marianita D. Dablio, Library Coordinator of Lourdes College, Cagayan de Oro City, explored the theme "Building Collections for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion." Dr. Dablio, quoting Emily Drabinsky, reminded attendees, "Libraries are for everyone, even people who are nothing like us. It is our professional responsibility to ensure that our readers can see themselves in our collections." Her presentation covered the essentials of DEI-informed collection building, addressing the challenges, available resources, and essential steps toward creating more inclusive collections.

In the second session, Prof. Leilannie M. Pangcatan, faculty member in the Department of Library and Information Science, presented on "Libraries as Spaces for DEI," discussing strategies for building libraries as inclusive and equitable community spaces. Prof. Pangcatan emphasized the role of libraries as transformative spaces that actively promote a welcoming environment for all.

The third session, led by faculty member Roshen M. Lomocso, tackled "Organizing and Providing Access to DEI." Ms. Lomocso's presentation included practical advice on organizing digital collections with DEI in mind, ensuring equitable access, and promoting inclusive digital resources. She introduced best practices and models that libraries can adopt to promote an inclusive digital library experience.

The fourth session invited Abduljaffar L. Mamintal, Head Librarian of the Lanao People's Park and Public Library, and Kamilah S. Unda, Chief Librarian of the Bangsamoro Library and Archives, to share their experiences. They detailed the services, programs, and achievements within their respective libraries, providing real-world examples of DEI in action within BARMM libraries. Workshops and group discussions followed each session, allowing attendees to collaborate and share insights. CE-Logic, Inc. concluded the first day with a presentation on its offerings, showcasing the resources and services available to libraries striving to support DEI goals in their collections and digital offerings.

The second day of the summit shifted focus to research presentations, providing an in-depth look at pressing issues and innovative findings in library science. Librarians and students showcased their studies on a variety of topics, reflecting the diverse roles libraries play in meeting community needs and supporting library staff. Each presentation offered valuable insights into ways libraries can enhance their services, support their teams, and better serve their patrons. Here's an overview of the topics presented:

## Resolution No. 327, Series of 2024

#### Revised Cash Incentives for Journal Publication of MSU-Marawi

To enhance the publication performance of the MSU Marawi as it seeks global recognition through world university rankings and impact rankings, only journals indexed in SCOPUS will be eligible for monetary incentives depending on the quartile (Q) rank of the journal by its subject group (field) as proposed in Table 1 with Table 2 as a reference for existing incentives for journals.

By motivating faculty, staff, and students to publish in SCOPUS-indexed journals and proceedings, MSU Main Campus intends to improve its visibility and credibility because SCOPUS is recognized as an extensive multidisciplinary database of citations and abstracts from peer-reviewed journals, trade publications, books, patent records, and conference proceedings, and esteemed for its

- stringent review process and high-quality standards,
- extensive readership,
- enhancement of academic credibility,
- facilitation of institutional linkages and collaborations,
- provision as bases for funding proposals and promotion approvals, and
- elevation of individual professional profiles.

Consequently, the contributions of MSU researchers in this manner will significantly advance the university's commitment to excellence, reputation, and overall performance.

This proposal shall repeal all previous BOR resolutions on JOURNAL PUBLICATION INCENTIVES except BOR Resolution No. 224, S. 2024 which allocates the monetary incentive of PhP 20,000 for full-paper articles published in conference proceedings journals indexed in SCOPUS irrespective of their status and quartile ranking.

Upon approval of this proposal by the MSU Board of Regents, implementing the revised incentives shall take effect for journals published on or after January 01, 2025, while the current incentive scheme remains in effect for journals published until December 31, 2024.

Integration of the ASEAN Journal of Science and Technology (AJOST) and the ASEAN Journal for Social Sciences and Humanities (AJOSSH) as Affiliated Journals of the Mindanao Journal



The integration of the ASEAN Journal of Science and Technology (AJOST) and the ASEAN Journal for Social Sciences and Humanities (AJOSSH) as affiliated journals of the Mindanao Journal of the Mamitua Saber Research Center (MSRC) preserves independent identities while leveraging the rich history of the Mindanao Journal (established in 1974). This unified academic platform elevates the academic status of the journals and strengthen their regional and international presence.

#### Brief History of the Mindanao Journal of MSRC

The Mindanao Journal was established in 1974 through the pioneering efforts of Dr. Mamitua D. Saber, the Dean of Research at the Mindanao State University and the founder of the Institute of Research for Filipino Culture (IFRC) and the University Research Center (URC). As a multidisciplinary publication managed by MSRC, the journal has long served as a key platform for disseminating research on Mindanao and Southern Philippines, particularly in the fields of social sciences, humanities, and applied sciences.

#### The ASEAN Journal of Science and Technology (AJOST) and the ASEAN Journal for Social Sciences and **Humanities (AJOSSH)**

#### **Brief History**

The ASEAN Journal of Science and Technology (AJOST) and the ASEAN Journal for Social Sciences and Humanities (AJOSSH) are flagship journals of MSRC. Launched as twin ASEAN journals, they continue the legacy of MSU visionaries such as Dr. Mamitua D. Saber, who sought to place the university at the forefront of intellectual discourse through scholarly publications and partnerships. The inaugural print issues of both AJOST and AJOSSH were released in November 2018.

#### Aims and Scope

Both AJOST and AJOSSH are double-blind, peer-reviewed, open-access, annual journals published by MSRC that contribute to the scholarly exchange within the ASEAN academic community.

- AJOST focuses on research in science and technology, with disciplines ranging from mathematics, physics, biology, chemistry, forestry and environmental studies, fisheries and aquatic sciences, agriculture, information technology, computing sciences, and medical and health sciences.
- AJOSSH publishes research in social sciences and humanities, covering topics like political science, sociology, anthropology, psychology, communication studies, media studies, public administration, public affairs, social work, international relations, global studies, gender and women studies, development studies, health and wellness studies, education, economics, law, library science, Islamic studies, tourism, hospitality and events studies, arts and culture, dance, folklore, language and linguistics, literature, music, history, philosophy and sports.

This renaming of the Mamitua Saber Research Center (MSRC) to the Mamitua Saber Institute of Research and Creation (MSIRC) reflects the expanded role of the center. The term "Creation" emphasizes the promotion and support of the production of creative works—such as literary, artistic and cultural endeavors—alongside research activities conducted by university constituents.

It is crucial to more accurately represent the university's involvement in creative disciplines, especially in the areas of creative arts, including literary and artistic works. Integrating creative works broadens the institute's scope, fostering interdisciplinary collaborations and elevating the center's impact. This rebranding aligns with the university's Charter by prioritizing research in Filipino Culture, Art, Science, Philosophy, and Literature.

Vision, Mission, Goals, and Objectives (VMGO) of MSIRC

#### Vision

The Mamitua Saber Institute of Research and Creation (MSIRC) aspires to lead in multidisciplinary research and creative works, producing high-quality publications responsive to local, national, and global challenges. MSIRC will also serve as the premier repository of the rich socio-cultural heritage of Mindanao and support the Mindanao State University's goal of becoming an internationally competitive research university.

#### Mission

The MSIRC fosters a dynamic research and creative culture by implementing and monitoring outputs protected under intellectual property laws. It secures funding and collaborations at national and international levels while maintaining its role as the main repository for the socio-cultural heritage of Mindanao.

#### Goals

- 1. Become a leading research and creative institute both nationally and internationally.
- 2. Generate sustainable, peer-reviewed, internationally indexed publications.
- Consistently secure substantial research and creative project funding.
- 4. Serve as the main repository of Mindanao's socio-cultural heritage and creative works.

#### **Objectives**

- 1. Foster a competitive environment that encourages faculty, staff, and students to engage in high-quality original, groundbreaking research and creative works.
- 2. Lead the development of research and creative programs aligned with university and national priorities.
- 3. Sustain research initiatives and creative projects promoting science, technology, humanities, and the socio-cultural heritage of Mindanao's indigenous peoples.
- 4. Plan, implement, and evaluate research and creative projects in MSU-Main Campus.
- 5. Encourage research and creative presentations at local, national, and international forums.
- Promote and maintain peer-reviewed, CHED-accredited journal publications, and creative outlets.
- 7. Enhance the capacity of researchers and creators in proposal development, technical writing, and creative documentation.
- Facilitate access to local and global funding sources.
- Protect intellectual property rights for research and creative outputs.
- 10. Promote and sustain national, regional, and international collaborations in research and creative endeavors.

## Resolution No. 369, Series of 2024

#### Proposed IP Incentives Program and their Guidelines for **MSU Main Campus**

#### **Rationale**

The Intellectual Property Incentives (IPI) program at MSU is designed to foster a culture of innovation and creativity within the university community. This incentive program is extended to inventors, researchers, faculty members, students, staff, and visiting professors engaged in research and creative activities under any program, project grant, or contract associated with the University.

The primary objective of the IPI program is to encourage the early disclosure of intellectual property and the assignment of rights, such as Utility Models (UM), Industrial Designs (ID), patent rights, and other related rights, including undisclosed information or know-how, to the University. This ensures that valuable intellectual assets are adequately protected and leveraged for the benefit of the entire MSU community.

These assignments and disclosures are conducted in strict compliance with contractual stipulations, Republic Act No. 8293, also known as the Intellectual Property Code of the Philippines, the Implementing Rules and Regulations of the Philippine Technology Transfer Act of 2009, and other relevant laws. Additionally, the program adheres to the System-wide MSU Intellectual Property Rights Policy and any additional guidelines or implementing rules issued by the Office of the President.

The MSU Board of Regents Resolution No. 14, Series of 2020, approved a total fixed amount of PhP100,000.00 per invention, disbursed in milestone-based tranches, to the inventor upon completion of the invention disclosure process as outlined in this IP incentive program guideline. Specifically, financial assistance of PhP50,000.00 is awarded to the researcher(s) and innovator(s) who receive no external funding, upon filing a patent application with IPOPHL's Bureau of Patents through the MSU Intellectual Property Office (MIPO). An additional cash incentive amounting to PhP50,000.00 is awarded to the inventor(s) upon the grant of a patent by IPOPHL.

It is imperative to incentivize other types of intellectual property, such as Utility Models (UM) and Industrial Designs (ID), to further support and acknowledge the diverse forms of innovation generated within the university. This approach not only enhances the IP portfolio and database of Mindanao State University but also strengthens efforts in technology transfer and the commercialization of research outputs.

By aligning with these legal and institutional frameworks, the IPI program not only safeguards the rights of inventors but also accelerates the commercialization and practical application of innovative research and entrepreneurial ideas. This contributes to MSU's mission of advancing knowledge and fostering socio-economic development through innovation and collaboration.

#### **Objectives**

As outlined in the Philippine Technology Transfer Act of 2009, the University shall provide incentives to its faculty members, researchers, students, staff, and visiting professors in accordance with prevailing laws. These incentives aim to support efforts in identifying valuable research outputs and intellectual property (IP), as well as advancing IP commercialization efforts. The IPI program is structured to adhere to the following objectives:

- 1. Expand and enhance the IP portfolio and database of Mindanao State University.
- 2. Support the commercialization of intellectual property generated within the university by providing incentives to inventors thereby facilitating the transfer of technology and knowledge
- Recognize and incentivize the dedication of inventors throughout the comprehensive journey, from preparing patent applications and IP registrations to obtaining patents and registrations.
- Foster the development of innovative research and encourage entrepreneurial concepts among inventors and researchers.
- Promote a proactive approach for the early disclosure of innovations, ideally before traditional publication, to safeguard inventors' rights, streamline technology transfer, enhance the impact of innovations, and initiate market development alongside IP protection, thereby accelerating the commercialization and practical application of groundbreaking research and entrepreneurial ideas.
