Portrait of a Meranaw Woman Leader of Many "Firsts"

Hadja Sittie Nurlayla Emily M. Marohombsar, fourth regular MSU System President and the first woman to hold said office, was born in Ganassi (Lanao del Sur), on September 7, 1935 to Gen. Louis R. Marohombsar, the first governor of undivided Lanao and Manuki M. Marohombsar, the first Miss Lanao. She was named "Pinamili", the Chosen One".

Emily, as she would later be known on records and in public dreamed of becoming a teacher thus it was no wonder that she should pursue BSEd, major in English, at the prestigious exclusive school for girls, Philippine Women's University in Manila, where the family took up residence after the expiration of the term of her father as governor in 1949. She graduated cum laude, the first Meranaw to set such a record, which only her younger sisters, Emma and Nena, would break after her.

As a working student, she enrolled in M.A. Literature (Dramatics) at Ateneo de Manila, and under the guidance of Fr. Reuters, essayed some parts in stage plays, and was thus the first Meranaw woman to appear onstage. Marriage to Atty. Abdul Marohombsar (later Vice Governor of Lanao del Sur, ARMM assemblyman, and COMELEC Commissioner) spelled giving up her graduate studies at Ateneo and a change of scene. In Marawi where she taught at Jamiatul Phil. Al-Islamia, and later as a pioneering member of the teaching force of the fledgling Mindanao State University (established in 1961), the young wife started to raise a family. In 1964-65, along with her sister Nena, she left for the U.S., on an East-West Center scholarship grant to finish an MA in Literature. Over 35 years later, she would be honoured as Outstanding East-West Center Alumna and was feted as such in New Delhi, India – another "first" for her race.

On her return from her studies abroad, she took on leadership positions – Chairman of the Humanities Division, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and Vice President for Academic Affairs. In recognition of her dedicated service as an educator, she received accolade as TOWNS Awardee (1977), still a "first" for a Meranaw woman leader. Taking pride in the footprints she had started making in her chosen field, her Alma Mater, PWU, paid her the highest tribute by conferring on her an honorary doctorate degree in education. Already a recognized icon of immense possibilities whose achievements served as a radiant beacon and inspiration to her fellow Muslim Meranaw women, she was appointed the first woman President of the Mindanao State University (1993-1999). During her tenure as MSU President, she was named by Malacanan as one of the "Dakilang Ina" awardees, an honor which she rightly and richly deserved as family always came first for her. She also received the Sultan Kudarat Award for her substantive leadership as helmsman of the premier institution of higher learning in Mindanao.

A charismatic and visionary leader, then President Emily Marohombsar enjoyed local, national and even regional acclaim and popularity. She gained further distinction when the Banda Aceh government in Indonesia bestowed upon her the title Cut Nyak Dien (literally translated as "heroine").

Peace being the core of her mission as an ardent advocate for the transformative power of education, she continued to serve the nation as the first Meranaw woman member of the GRP-MILF Negotiating Panel (1998-2004).

It is not, however, her rich harvest of "firsts" that left indelible images on the minds and memories of students, fellow workers, and relatives who knew Hadja Sittie Nurlaylah "Emily" up close and personal. It is her humanity – her kindness, gentleness and thoughtfulness – that people remember best about her – e.g. a poor student who fondly recalls receiving from her some money for fare to go home during the semestral break; a younger sister who nostalgically remembers how her favorite sister patiently handcarried an LP of Callas' famous opera opuses like a precious piece of Ming or Tang vase across seven states while on a U.S. tour - a gift for her; how she sewed skirts for her as a little girl, with what was left of the cloth she made into a skirt for herself; and Frank's and his classmates remembrance of how their Literature teacher would treat them to film viewing of film versions of Shakespeare's plays and served them roasted turkey meat, this last definitely a rare 'first' experience for her class, most of whom came from underprivileged families.

"The exchange has been an eye-opener of sorts. There are certain academic practices here that are different from ours, so familiarity with the disparity is needed to adjust appropriately. So far the experience has been mutually positive inside the classroom." These are the very words of Prof. Anifa G. Alonto-Nagamura of the English Department of the Mindanao State Unviersity- Marawi Campus when asked about her current state in Turkey.

Anifa embarked on a faculty exchange program between MSU and Kastamonu University in Turkey. She was assigned to the position and began her teaching duties last February, contributing to the faculty by instructing English courses in the School of Foreign Languages.

As a Meranaw, I can't help but feel a sense of pride. She was a member of the Meranaw cultural mapping team from 2018 to 2020, and she has shown great enthusiasm in exploring her roots while making a meaningful impact in her community. She is truly a dedicated faculty member and an active participant in the community.

Anifa, as we affectionately refer to her, is an associate professor from our college, the College of Social Sciences and Humanities (CSSH) here in Marawi City. As a professional, she earned her bachelor's degree in Speech Communication from the University of the Philippines, Diliman, and went on to obtain her master's degree in English Language Teaching from the Graduate Studies Department at the College of Social Sciences and Humanities, Mindanao State University-Marawi.

Her academic journey reflects a deep commitment to both her personal growth and the educational advancement of her community. Anifa's dedication to bridging cultural and educational gaps is evident in her pursuit of knowledge and her willingness to share it across borders. She is always a friend to many on campus, especially when it comes to sharing important Islamic teachings that she wishes to convey to everyone.

In addition to her teaching responsibilities, Anifa has been actively involved in various research projects focusing on language and cultural preservation, particularly within the Meranaw community under the Meranaw Cultural Heritage Center's program and projects. Her work motivates future generations to value and maintain their distinctive identities as Meranaw. Through her exposure to Western education and her ongoing efforts to promote Islam as a way of life, she aims to share this knowledge with everyone. This is how I admire her as a person and relative here in Marawi.

As a dedicated professional, she has committed over 20 years of her career to education. She has taught in both the English Department and the Communication Studies Department at CSSH at MSU, before embarking on an international teaching journey in Libya. She was subsequently part of the English Department within the College of Education at Misurata University before moving to a more structured institution at Benghazi University.

Upon her return to the Philippines, she resumed her teaching position in the English Department at MSU-Marawi. Professor Nagamura has several published works, the latest being a Meranaw folk tale titled "A Datu's Precious Gift," which was featured in an anthology of Philippine and Indonesian folk stories published in Indonesia.

As a colleague, I have observed her elegant public speaking engagements on campus. She is among my top choices for hosting events, both at national and international conferences held at the University.

If you are one of Anifa's friends and are reading this article about her, consider yourself fortunate, just as I feel blessed to know this remarkable woman. She embodies the qualities of an excellent teacher, speaker, and an inspiring Muslimah. We can only hope that Allah continues to guide her in her journey at Kastamonu University in Turkey.

Empowering MSU's IGP Units: A Two-Day Basic Budgeting Workshop

Mindanao State University - Main Campus recently held a two-day Basic Budgeting Workshop for its Income Generating Project (IGP) Units at the CHTM Pavilion. Themed "Uncovering the Potentials of Budgeting," the workshop aimed to equip IGP units with the knowledge and skills necessary for sustainable financial management and improved revenue generation.

The first day, February 25, 2025, focused on foundational budgeting principles. Dr. Imara C. Andam, CPA emphasized the crucial role of strategic budgeting in the university's growth. Representing the Dean of the College of Business Administration and Accountancy (CBAA), Prof. Sahraman D. Hadji Latif, MS, ME, College Secretary Oliver U. Limato Jr. highlighted the importance of effective budgeting for supporting the university's IGP initiatives. Prof. Johara M. Marandacan, CPA, also provided a clear overview of the workshop's objectives and agenda.

A series of insightful lectures provided a comprehensive understanding of budgeting. Majdi D. Jalal, CPA, addressed the "Why of Budgeting," underscoring its importance for financial stability, accountability, and strategic decision-making. Building on this foundation, Prof. Alcasar P. Maonaco, CPA, REB, delved into "The How of Budgeting," offering practical guidance on developing and implementing effective budgets, including essential techniques and best practices. Dr. Aldrich June B. Caraecle, REB, REA, concluded the lectures with a presentation on "Growing Your Income Generating Project," sharing valuable strategies and insights on maximizing IGPs for sustainable growth and revenue generation. His presentation included case studies of successful IGP models and practical advice on overcoming common challenges.

The day concluded with a hands-on workshop focused on conducting a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) analysis for each IGP unit, setting financial goals, and developing initial strategic plans. Participants actively engaged in group discussions and exercises, applying the knowledge gained from the lectures.

The second day commenced with the continuation of the SWOT analysis presentations from Day One. Representatives from various IGP units—including the Housing Management Division, Food Services Division, Ceramics Center, College of Sports, Physical Education and Recreation (CSPEAR), and College of Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences (CFAS) - presented their findings and discussed potential strategies for improvement. This provided a valuable opportunity for peer learning and cross-departmental collaboration.

The second workshop focused on translating the SWOT analyses into actionable strategies and developing realistic revenue projections. Participants were guided through exercises designed to help them create detailed, financially sound plans for their respective IGP units. This included identifying key performance indicators (KPIs), developing marketing and sales strategies, and forecasting revenue based on realistic assumptions and market analysis. The facilitators provided personalized feedback and guidance to ensure the plans were both ambitious and achievable.

The two-day Basic Budgeting Workshop successfully empowered MSU's IGP units with the essential knowledge and skills for enhanced financial management and sustainable growth. The combination of theoretical lectures and practical, hands-on workshops equipped participants with the tools to develop and implement effective budgeting strategies, leading to improved financial performance and greater contribution to the university's overall financial sustainability. The collaborative environment fostered during the workshop also promoted cross-departmental communication and strengthened relationships among MSU's IGP units. The university anticipates significant positive impacts on the financial health and future growth of its IGPs as a result of this valuable training.

MSU Strengthens Research and Extension Initiatives at 2nd R&D Summit

The Mindanao State University- Main Campus successfully conducted its 2nd Research and Development (R&D) Summit on February 6-8, 2025, at Estregan Beach Resort, Sultan Naga Dimaporo, Lanao del Norte, with the goal of fostering collaboration, sharing insights, and exploring effective strategies to advance the university's research, extension, and development programs. The summit also aimed to align MSU's R&D initiatives with the Department of Budget and Management (DBM) targets and priority agenda, as well as President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr.'s 8-point socioeconomic agenda.

The summit was organized by the Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research, Extension, and Development (OVCRED), headed by Vice Chancellor Fema M. Abamo. It brought together faculty members from various MSU campuses, including MSU-Main Campus, MSU-Lanao National College of Arts and Trades (LNCAT), MSU-Maigo School of Arts and Trades (MSAT), MSU-Lanao del Norte Agricultural College (LNAC), MSU-Buug, MSU-Main Campus Sindangan and Bataraza Extensions. Also present were University Officials, Special Assistants to the Office of the President, members of the University Research, Extension, and Development Council (UREDC), consultative bodies, and personnel from various MSU-Main administrative units.

The summit officially commenced with a warm welcome address from Dr. Indhira B. Dimaporo-Tawantawan, the Superintendent of MSU-LNAC and co-organizer of the event. Hon. Ulwan M. Dimaporo, the Vice Mayor of Sultan Naga Dimaporo, also graced the event and expressed his full support for MSU's R&D initiatives.

Day 1: Learning from Best Practices

The first day of the summit featured an insightful presentation by Dr. Rey Y. Capangpangan, the Vice Chancellor for Research, Innovation, and Global Engagement of MSU-Naawan, who

shared their best practices in research and development. His discussion provided valuable insights into improving research productivity and fostering innovative outputs aligned with national development goals.

Following his talk, panel discussions were conducted that allowed participants to share their insights, raise concerns, and provide feedback on the presentation. These fostered a dynamic exchange of ideas in the field of research and development. The participants were able to engage in meaningful discussions regarding potential challenges, opportunities, and areas for improvement in research activities.

The first day ended with the presentation of the 2024 Research and Development (R&D) notable accomplishments of OVCRED and the participating MSU campuses, which specifically showcased their successful research projects, publications, and community extension engagements from the previous year.

Day 2: Aligning Research Programs with National Priorities

The second day opened with a presentation on the MSU-Marawi Research and Extension Budget by Sittle Nadjerah M. Marohom, CPA, the Director of the Campus Budget Office. She provided an overview of the research and extension financial framework, ensuring that the participants were informed of the funding landscape and budget utilization for the fiscal year.

Following the budget presentation, Vice Chancellor Fema M. Abamo facilitated a collaborative workshop focused on aligning research and extension programs with DBM targets and priority themes. This session aimed to streamline the university's research thrusts to meet national funding standards and performance indicators. Participants were guided in formulating viable and high-impact research proposals designed to address socio-economic needs and secure potential funding from DBM and other external funding agencies.

The workshop also emphasized the importance of interdisciplinary collaboration among MSU campuses to maximize research resources, expand networks, and increase the impact of research outcomes. Faculty members were

encouraged to collaborate across disciplines and campuses to generate multidisciplinary research outputs addressing real-world societal challenges.

Additionally, directors from various offices under OVCRED presented their respective mandates and strategic directions, ensuring that their objectives remain aligned with the university's overarching research and development agenda.

Day 3: Policy and Institutional **Support for Research Engagement**

Glen A. Lorenzo, PhD, the Vice President for Research and Extension. The presentation focused on BOR #130, s. 2023, which is the streamlining of research and extension involvement in the Individual Performance Commitment and Review (IPCR), a policy for enhancing faculty engagement at the MSU System. This policy aims to integrate research and extension efforts into faculty performance assessments, ensuring greater participation and accountability in advancing MSU's research agenda.

The University President, Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno, represented by his Special Assistant, Dr. Mahid M. Mangontarum, expressed his message of support and lauded the participants for their unwavering commitment to advancing research and extension initiatives. 

Rebranding of the University Extension Services Center (UESC) to University Extension Services - Ranaw Sustainability and Resiliency Center (UES-RSRC)



The rebranding of the UESC to UES-RSRC represents a strategic evolution that expands the Center's role in community development, to encompass a focused commitment to environmental resilience and sustainable management. While continuing its legacy of socio economic support and capacity building, the UES-RSRC will specifically address the sustainability of the Ranaw Watersheds, which includes Lake Lanao and its surrounding ecosystems in the Lanao provinces, which are essential to the well-being of local communities and biodiversity. This rebranding aligns UESC's foundational extension programs and community services with a more targeted watershed- and sustainability-based approach, reflecting the urgent need for comprehensive environmental stewardship.

This transition emphasizes the critical role that sustainable watershed management plays in advancing the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly by fostering resilient economies and adaptive communities that can thrive in balance with their natural environments. By integrating SDGs-focused research, community engagement, policy advocacy, and sustainable practices into every aspect of the center's work, UES-RSRC will be positioned as a model for sustainable watershed management and climate resilience, in Mindanao and beyond.

Sustainable watershed management has shown to substantially contribute to the advancement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly in promoting economic growth and resilience alongside environmental protection and conservation. It also fosters eco-tourism, sustainable agriculture, and job creation in sectors such as reforestation and water services, social services, and peace (Environmental

Protection Agency, 2012, Naji et al., 2024). Efficient water use programs reduce economic vulnerabilities, especially for agriculture-dependent economies (Batey, P.W.J. & Kim, J.S., 2021). Access to cleaner water improves health outcomes, reducing water-borne diseases, and enhancing community resilience to climate change and water-related disasters (Bunch et al., 2014).

Additionally, integrating gender equality by involving women in water governance aligns with SDG 5: Gender Equality, leading to improved quality of life in vulnerable regions (UNDP-SIWI Water Governance Facility, 2016). Sustainable watershed management practices help maintain ecosystem services, reduce flood risks, improve water quality, and preserve biodiversity (Environmental Protection Agency, 2012). These practices also support climate resilience by mitigating the impacts of droughts and floods (Environmental Protection Agency, 2012). Finally, robust governance frameworks and international cooperation, crucial in scaling up watershed management efforts (FAO, n.d.), reflect progress toward SDG 17: Partnerships for the Goals. Analogously, the rebranding of the UESC, will cater for the advancement of the SDGs, in conjunction with the 10-point Research and Development Agenda of MSU, as can be seen in Table 1 below.

An inclusive, equitable, and sustainable future envisioned under the SDGs, can be achieved through sustainable watershed management. It is this backdrop that underpins this proposal to rebrand the UESC. This change will tackle the longstanding but under-addressed reality of the plight of the Ranaw watershed, home to one of the world's 17 ancient lakes -Lake Lanao; where sustainable management of its watershed resources remain wanting, and attempts to do so are inconsistent, and fragmented (Garcia-Hansel & Metillo, 2016).

Resolution No. 450, Series of 2024

University Student Leadership Award (USLA)

THE UNIVERSITY STUDENT LEADERSHIP AWARD (USLA) is the highest Leadership Award the Mindanao State University given to a student in recognition of his/her potentials, performance and achievements as a TOTAL LEADER. The winner is the epitome of scholastic and moral excellence, inspiring leadership, idealism and performance and a vision that sets the awardee apart from the rest. He/She personifies the commitment of MSU student constituents and has TANGIBLE ACHIEVEMENTS, which are distinctly above those of his/her peers.

A. Procedure for Nomination

- 1. The USLA is open to all graduating students in a Bachelor's degree of the University who has met the minimum qualifications and has been duly recommended by the College where his/her degree will be granted.
- 2. Each college is entitled to nominate at most three (3) students who have no more thanthree (3) failing grades. A nominee must be graduating and must have not been extended in his program for more than two semesters.
- 3. Once a candidate is nominated, it cannot be replaced nor withdrawn anymore.
- 4. All nominations must be submitted to the Office of the Director, Division of Student Affairs (DSA) or its equivalent on or before October 31 for the first semester and April 30 for the second semester awardee.

B. The Screening Committee

A SCREENING COMMITTEE shall be responsible for the search as designated by the University President and shall serve for a term of two (2) years with the following membership:

Chairperson CSS/VCAA*
Vice Chairperson Director, DSA/OSA

Members Director, Office of Admissions

University Reaistrar

Director, PMS (OP/OC/PMS Representative)

Senior Faculty Member (at least 15 to 20 years in service)

Student Representative (randomly chosen)

USLA Recipient/Outstanding Alumni

Secretariat: Chairperson (DSA Staff) and Five (5) Members of the DSA Staf

The committee shall receive through the Secretariat all nominations, together with the credentials supporting the achievements of the nominees;

C. The Committee shall follow the herein phases of the selection process:

Phase I Pre-Qualification (meeting the minimum requirements)
Phase II Quantitative evaluation of submitted credentials
Phase III Impact Assessment from 10 students in every College

Phase IV Interview Phase V Ranking

D. Submission of Credentials

- 1. All credentials must be received by the DSA through the Chairperson of the Secretariat on the date set by the committee;
- All photocopies must be authenticated against the original document by the DSA Staff and/or Secretariat:
- 3. Only the achievements of the nominees when they have been officially enrolled in MSUas a student shall be counted/considered.

PHASE I

PRE-QUALIFICATION FOR NOMINEES (Minimum Requirements)

ALL ITEMS MUST BE FULLY SATISFIED

- 1. Certifications of all advisors of the registered student organizations which the nominee is/ was a member attesting to the fact that the behavior and morality of the nominee is above reproach;
- 2. Certification from the Student Discipline Board (College Disciplinary Board and University) certifying that the nominee has not been subjected to disciplinary action;
- 3. Certificate from the Registrar that the nominee is currently enrolled in; and
- 4. The college, in cases of several potential nominees, may use this scheme as preliminary screening in deciding who shall be officially nominated.
- *The College Dean can recommend but it is not a pre-qualification requirement.

PHASE II

QUANTITATIVE EVALUATION

The University Leadership Awardees shall be selected from among the nominees according to the criteria set forth. The SUM TOTAL of points accumulated shall be the basis for the final selection.

- 1. The nominee who has accumulated not less than Seventy (70) points will qualify for Phase III;
- 2. If no one among the nominees for a given academic semester satisfies the requiredminimum 70 points, no University Student Leadership Award shall be given for the said academic semester;

REFERENCE SURVEY/IMPACT ASSESSMENT

Impact Assessment Questionnaires shall be distributed to 10 graduating students per college. This is to give a chance for students of all colleges to rate with the results giving the USLA selection committee a general feel of their sentiments/views regarding the quality of leadership practiced by all the USLA finalists.

10 Graduating Students per College

= 10X14 = 140 Survey questionnaires

Procedure: Each respondent will be asked to rank the five (5) candidates in accordance to the order of their preference as University Student Leader. This will be conducted by the DSA for a period not more than one week. Hence, the names of the finalist will be given and the respondent will simply rank them. Rank No. 1 shall receive 5 points, rank No. 2 shall receive 4 points, rank No. 3 likewise receives 3 points, rank No. 4 shall receive 2 points and the rank No. 5 shall have 1 point.

Tabulation and computation will be done by one of the search committee members assisted by the Secretariat and the results shall be submitted for deliberation by the committee en banc.

PHASE IV

Top three (3) shall be subjected to interview before the screening committee.

The applicants shall be ranked using the general criteria. The applicant with the highest point obtained will be declared as the USLA. In case of a tie i.e., when two nominees obtained the same highest accumulated points, then both shall be declared awardees for the given academic year (semester).

In 2024, the University Extension Services Center of the MSU Main Campus achieved remarkable success. A total of 54 extension projects were approved and effectively executed, all in alignment with MSU's steadfast commitment to advancing the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These initiatives underscore the enduring dedication of MSU President Atty. Basari D. Mapupuno to addressing societal challenges and promoting inclusive development.


The University allocated a substantial sum of Php 3,653,750.00 for these projects, emphasizing its commitment to academic excellence, research, and community service. Among the colleges, the CPA emerged as the top performer with the highest number of 9 approved and implemented projects. The CFES closely followed with 7 projects, while both the CSSH and CED made significant contributions with 6 impactful projects each. In terms of funding, the CFES secured the largest allocation of Php 1.442 million, followed by the CSSH with Php 610,000, and the CPA with Php 385,300.

Collectively, these efforts demonstrate the University's commitment to driving meaningful change, promoting sustainability and resilience, and progressing towards the achievement of the 2030 SDGs. The year 2024 was indeed a banner year for the OVCRED's University Extension Services Center.


MSU-Main Campus' 54 Extension Projects Contribution to SDGs




Number of Extension Projects By Fund Source




Extension Projects Fund Source vs Approved Budget




2024 Number of Extension Projects vs College Performance




2024 Internally Funded Projects vs College Performance



2024 GAA-Approved Special R&D vs College Performance




2024 Externally Funded Projects vs College Performance

2023 Internally Funded Projects vs College Performance





As we embark on the sacred month of Ramadhan 2025, we do not just fast for food and water. We do pray and reflect alongside over a billion believers worldwide. For the Muslims of Lanao del Sur—a province in the Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao-Islam is not just a faith but a cornerstone of identity and community—Ramadhan holds profound significance, transcending mere ritual to become a vital lifeline for spiritual renewal and healing. To a Muslim Meranaw like me, Ramadhan is a powerful moment to reconnect with Allah and reflect on what the Mindanao State University taught me in time.

I have been at the university since 1993, over the past decades, and I still feel the missing link between being faithful and being a true Muslim living with dignity and integrity. I understand that because of the systemic graft and political turmoil in the country, it is too tough to be a Muslim. Over the years, I have observed a decline in the university, which has shrunk from over a thousand hectares of land to only about three hundred hectares or even less. Why is this happening in a university built for Mindanawans? Have we forgotten its purpose?

In the current administration, the Land Use Committee has been conquering tough traditions and hearts to continue having faith in making the university a place for educating the people of Lango, if not the whole of Mindango. However, this fight is becoming increasingly difficult each day. Mushrooming private houses on empty lands, cottage backyards, and major academic and official streets. A colleague once said, "Sor, baka sa susunod, meron nang bahay sa aitna na golf course [Sor, maybe next time, there will be a house in the middle of the golf course.].


Her remark was not a sarcasm, I know that it is a possibility. This administration has been trying to fight all these by continuing to believe in the individuals who are true believers in Islam. Being part of the Traffic Management team of the University, I see and witnessed the burden hurdled each day. However, there are those who would really want change.

I witnessed real Muslims who follow rules on traffic especially at the one-way blue zones; and there are tricycle drivers who would officially register and pay what is due to them. We can only pray that they continue to be good. In fact, I believe that for as long as we have faith in Allah and with people who see truth and beauty in dignity, I believe one day, this irreversible turmoil in the University will end.

We are not perfect but because we want to listen and we want to be heard, may this special opinion column open our hearts and think of solutions to every problem we have each day.


